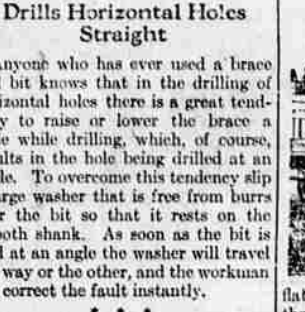
protects him and serves amply to prevent blisters and burns. The nozzle proper is mounted in a ball socket, so that it can be swung in any direction with equal facility.

"Knock-'Em-Dead" Rat Trap

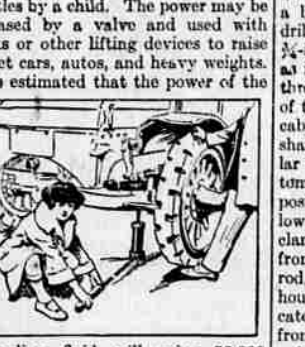

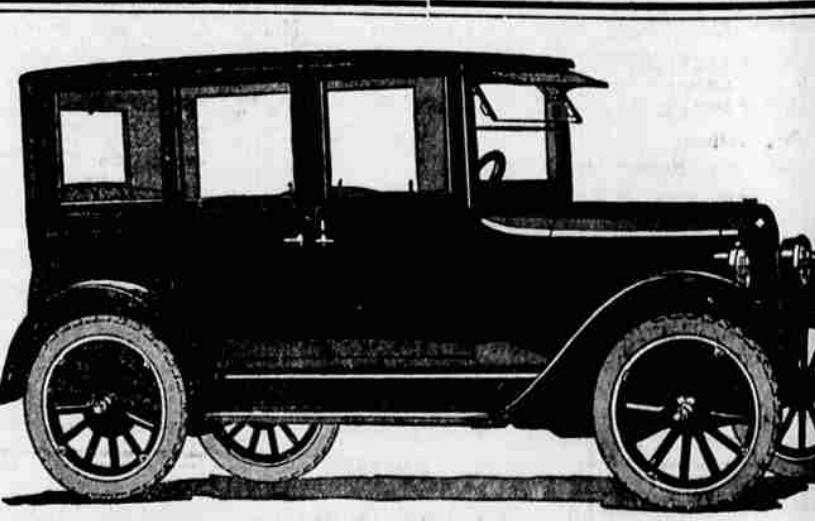
