FRENCH DUKE SCRATCHED ON ARM HONOR SATISFIED

PARIS, Oct. 23.—In a duel fought today over a blow struck in a theatre ticket tax dispute, Duke Lanza de Camastra, Italian nobleman, was wounded in the arm by a thrust from the sword of Jacques Richepin, author and husband of Cora Laparcerie, actress-theatre manager. The wound was not dangerous. The author was declared the winner.

The dispute arose at the Cora Laparcerie theatre, when the duke tried to collect a government tax on a free ticket presented by the duke. Richepin tried to explain matters, but the duke became offended and is said to have applied the epithet, "blackguard," to the poet, Richepin responding with a slap on the duke's cheek.

OREGON TO HOLD LAST HARD PRACTICE TODAY

Football Fans Invited Out to Watch Workout

TRAINING TABLE STARTS

Coach Huntington Feels Vandalia In Contest Set For Saturday: Fittke Great Player

This afternoon on Hayward field the university football squad will go through one of the most rigorous grid practices of the season and all followers of the game are urged to be out to get a line on the varsity team. A hard scrimmage period, during which real football tactics will feature, will be an important part of the program. This will be the last hard practice before the Idaho clash Saturday, and the next two days will be spent in conditioning exercises.

A training table has now been established at the university, and the men are given lessons in field tactics following every meal. Coach Huntington, coach, realizes perhaps more than does anyone else, that the coming contest will make or break Oregon's chances for the championship of the Northwest conference, and he further realizes that Idaho has one of the most dangerous eleven in the conference.

For the first time in several years the Vandals are putting a team in the field that has no real weaknesses, and moreover is strong in both departments, the line and the backfield. Its double-barreled action includes a powerful offense and a well-like line on the defense. They also have what most teams usually lack, a kicker who can boot the ball for a greater average than can most of his opponents.

Veterans Will Start Game

Huntington has not yet announced his lineup for the game Saturday, but it is expected that most of the men who have gone in previous contests will get the berths to start, at least. The center position still is in doubt, however, and will be until the start of the game. Both Sinclair and Wilson are doing great work at this place. In the Whitman game, Sinclair, who last year played with the Trojans, performed like a veteran, and his passing is accurate and swift. Wilson is steady and is more dependable, but he is not quite as fast.

The other line berths will be occupied by the usual regulars, it is expected, except that the huge Cog Campbell may get a try before the game is over. Dick Reed, who has recovered from an infection on his ankle, is again going strong, and those who have observed him play, assert that he is getting stronger, and more dangerous every game. Vonder Ahe, one of the biggest men out, is a sure bet, while Mills and Bailey are now going like steam rollers at the guard positions.

Three good men are ready to go in at end, Williamson, Mauts and Riley, and they are sure of dependable work from all of them.

Backfield Combination Famous

The backfield combination is now becoming one of the most feared on the coast, and the field quartet, Chapman at quarter, Latham and Sax at half, and Terjesen at full, will no doubt start the game. French, Poulson and Kirby are all trained to step in should any part of the combination go wrong, and the machine will go on almost as smooth as ever.

For Idaho, the great Pitke stands out as one of the headiest, cleverest and most skillful men in the conference. His kicking this year has brought forth a mass of amusement from sport writers, and his ability to get over the ground is perhaps what has placed Idaho in the category of possibilities for the Coast or at least the Northwest title.

In the Realm of Sports

SEATTLE, Oct. 23.—Mark Shaughnessy, well-known manager of Young Jack McAllister, has taken over Jack McDonald, of Seattle, in leading young boys of weight, according to an announcement today. McDonald received high praise from Jack Dempsey when he knocked out Jack Sayes in a preliminary bout at the Dempsey-Gibbons championship fight at Shelby, Montana.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 23.—Portland baseball officials are looking forward to the winter meetings of the Pacific Coast baseball league, which according to advices received by them, may be held at Catalina Island November 5. President W. H. McCarthy sent word that he had notified President Patrick of the Los Angeles club which will be host at the meeting, that the club directors would gather at Catalina if accommodations could be assured.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 23.—A special section of the stand at Multnomah field has been reserved for rooters of the University of California for the football game here Saturday between California and Washington State college.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23.—The University of Southern California football team returned today with the big O after leaving 32 points in Seattle for a University of Washington victory last Saturday. Coach Elmer Anderson will re-examine his lineup for Saturday's meet with Stanford at Palo Alto. Rest on the side lines and Adams will take center. Otto Anderson will not start, but Gene Dorsey will

take an end and Dupuy will replace Earle at guard.

SEATTLE, Oct. 23.—With the first month of the 1923 football season virtually over, the University of Washington football team is tied for first place with Idaho and California in the Pacific Coast conference, and with Idaho, Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college for the Northwest conference lead. The Huskies also lead both conferences in scoring, according to figures published here.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23.—When Andy Kerr, coach of the Stanford football squad heard Saturday of Washington's defeat of University of Southern California team, he frankly said he was sorry. Kerr admitted that Stanford would have had a better chance in its coming game with U. S. C. had the latter been victorious than he expects now in stacking up against a squad, as he expressed it, "raving mad" at its loss in Washington state.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23.—Vernon and Los Angeles baseball club representatives will make an effort at the annual meeting or minor league clubs in Chicago in being made minor league clubs that will take care of players sent out under contract next summer.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23.—Alex McDonald, the hard-punching San Francisco featherweight, is being considered for a bout with Dick Griffin as a result of the trimming he gave Young Farrell here Saturday night. It was Farrell's first defeat in a local ring in more than 12 months.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 23.—Competition is unusually keen among the 25 men who are running the course of the trials of the cross country team of Oregon Agricultural college. Another championship cross country team is looked for by Coach R. O. Coleman because of the large number of aspirants in practice.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 23.—The Pacific Coast hockey season will officially open here November 12 when the Seattle and Vancouver hockey teams play the first match of the 1923-24 schedule, according to an announcement issued after the 13th annual meeting of the Pacific Coast Hockey association today.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 23.—Throngs of alumni and other guests and friends of Oregon Agricultural college are expected to pack the grand stand and bleachers at Bell field for the O. A. C. University of Washington football game November 3, which will be the big event of the coming weekend. One hundred editors and their wives from all parts of the state will be entertained by Sigma Delta Chi, national professional journalistic fraternity, at luncheon and at the game.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 23.—Charles "Dad" Quick, famous maker of racing saddles, celebrated his 103d birthday today. IDAHO SQUAD HOLDS HARD PRACTICE FOR BIG BATTLE

Coach Matthews Is Drilling Team In New Offensive

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 23.—The University of Idaho football squad is undergoing hard practice this week in preparation for its Pacific coast conference game with the University of Oregon at Eugene next Saturday. It is not expected any members of the regular lineup will be prevented by injuries from playing. The team leaves for Eugene Thursday night. Coach Matthews is drilling the team in a new offensive for use against Oregon, as the Washington State college game last Saturday was declared to have been witnessed by an Oregon coach.

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 23.—A ten-car special train, with accommodations for 200 passengers, is being arranged to carry University of Idaho rooters to Boise for the armistice day game with Oregon Agricultural college. The train will leave for Boise November 9 and return here November 12. From Boise the special, carrying the team and coaches will be taken to Palo Alto and Los Angeles for the Vandals' games with Stanford and the University of Southern California.

PAPYRUS ON WAY BACK

ENGLISH DERBY WINNER AND RETIREE DEPART

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—Papyrus, English derby winner, tonight is on his way back home after a 20-day journey to the international thoroughbred laurels that proved in vain Saturday when the American star, Zev, trounced the invading three-year-old in a mile and a half race at Belmont park.

Accompanying Papyrus aboard the Aquatania were his jockey, Steve Donoghue, and others of his retinue including a party of British sportsmen who came over for the match.

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 23.—Zev, the conqueror of the English derby winner, Papyrus, and My Own, Rear Admiral Grayson's crack three-year-old, will positively appear in the great championship stake, to be run at Latonia November 3, a telegram received by the Latonia racing officials from Colonel Matt J. Winn, general manager of the Kentucky Jockey club, stated today.

GREEK REVOLT PUT DOWN

GOVERNMENT FORCES ROUT MUTINEERS HORDES

(By The Associated Press)

ATHENS, Oct. 23.—Official information shows that the government has been successful in its struggle to put down the revolt started Monday with General Makris as leader. It was not without fighting, however, that the government forces were able to break the revolt. Among the more important engagements was one near Chehalis, where one of the chief factors in the movement, General Diliaras and his corps came into conflict with regular troops under General Othelloas. Of the 1400 mutineers, 800 were made prisoners. The extent of the casualties in the fighting is not yet known.

It was announced officially that the mutineers at Schinaria had fled northward, deserting their leaders. The same communique confirmed the dispersal of a group of mutineers at Katerina and the capture of their officers.

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AVIATORS REACH LEWIS

SMITH, RICHTER DELAYED BY HEAVY FOG BAK

CAMP LEWIS, Oct. 23.—Captain Lowell H. Smith and Lieutenant John P. Richter, who were en route to attempt a non-stop flight from the Canadian border to Mexico, arrived here at dusk after leaving Eugene, Oregon, late this afternoon. The aviators were delayed on account of a heavy fog which had been blowing from the coast since the morning, and the flight was postponed until the morning for Blaine, Wash., and prepare for the hop-off Thursday.
