TEAM AVERAGE IS 173

Last night the University of Oregon football machine wound up its period of intensive training for the annual team with a hard scrimmage and being buffeted by the determined second string men. The whole squad settled down to work with a seriousness that indicated that Coach Huntington had made them realize the importance of the outcome of Saturday's classic battle.

The practice opened with a series of runs from kick-off, and was followed by the hardest scrimmage yet. With one or two exceptions the men are in excellent condition, and exercises planned for between now and Saturday are intended to keep them that way. Both Mills and Reed were missing last night; Mills due to a slight infection on his foot, and Reed to a carbuncle on his ankle. Both are expected to be ready for the opening whistle for the Vandal clash, however.

The Oregon lineup is expected to be the same as started the Whitman game. The average weight will be 173 pounds, unless the 200-pound Cog Campbell goes in, in which case it will be raised. Sinclair has been doing excellent work at center and Mills and Bailey will play on either side. Reed and Vonder Ahe are in good shape for the tackle berth, while Risley and Williamson have been doing good work at ends. In the backfield, Chapman, quarter, Terjesen and Sax, half, and Latham, full, are now working to as near perfection as an Oregon backfield ever worked. Reserve men who are ready include Biles, Shields, Mays, Gooding, Wiswall and Mautz for the line, and Paulson and French for the backfield. Kirby, who was again injured, and it is doubtful if he will be ready by Saturday.

Vandal Lineup Given
The probable lineup announced by the Vandal coaches is Huefner and Nelson, ends; Housen and Quinn, tackles; Tappen and Buckline, guards; Kline, center; Blake and Davis, at half berths; Davidson, quarter, and Kinnison, full-back.

The Gem Staters have succeeded in taking away a large percentage of the games with Oregon, and have not yet won one. This has increased their determination and word from Moscow is that they are bending every effort to perfect a defense that will break up Oregon's wonderful backfield combination, and an offense that will tear through the Lemon Yellow line.

Preparations are being made to take care of a huge crowd of football enthusiasts, and word of the desperation of the contest is being spread by many followers who witnessed the stiff contest of the field last night. The game will start at 2:30 and will be interspersed with the most ardent bursts of Oregon spirit yet shown on Hayward field. Students will turn out en masse and make a big feature for installing the team and the big crowd with the spirit that will carry the Lemon Yellow team to victory are now being devised by Jack Myers, yell king.

wanted to know more about Thompson. The witness added that Thompson had gotten into "difficulties with the government on war contracts and then was under indictment," but added that he did not know whether this was known to Forbes.

In April Forbes and Mortimer went to Philadelphia for two days, according to Mortimer, who said he paid the bill at the Ritz-Carlton for Forbes. From there they went to New York and had several parties at the apartment of a Mr. Content, a friend of the director, where Forbes was staying. Present, he said, were Forbes, Mr. and Mrs. Content, J. W. Thompson, Mrs. Mortimer and the witness. Among the guests also, he added, was Charles F. Cramer, former general counsel of the veterans bureau, who committed suicide here last March after his retirement from the bureau last February at a time when the conduct of the bureau was under fire in congress.

During the stay in New York, tours of inspection of hospital sites in New York and Connecticut were made, the witness testified. Also there were some conferences between Forbes and Thompson at which Mortimer said he was present.

ALMOST PERFECT BABY IS PRIZE WINNER

Meantime, Forbes had moved to the Wardman Park Inn and Mortimer said that in conference there with Forbes the director told him he was going on a tour of inspection of hospital sites on the Pacific coast and invited the witness and Mrs. Mortimer to accompany him. Then, according to Mortimer, Forbes stated that his wife had gone to Europe and he was "hard up."

"How much do you want?" I asked him, Mr. Mortimer said. "Five thousand dollars" was the sum he named. I didn't have it, but I talked with Thompson and Black, who were on the inn veranda, and gave them the money.

Soon afterwards the Pacific coast trip was started and when the party reached Chicago Mortimer said, he arranged to borrow \$10,000 from Thompson. He received twenty \$500 bills, he declared, and gave ten of them to Forbes in the bathroom of a suite at the Drake hotel that night while a "party" was in progress. The witness said he asked Forbes for a note, but that the latter only laughed.

Mortimer testified that he obtained the remaining \$5000 to pay the expenses of the western trip and that the cost was \$5400. Drinking began as soon as the party reached San Francisco, he said, telling later of "having parties" at Rough and Ready Island near Stockton, at the home of a woman friend of the director, which, he asserted, had "a bar as long as this room," and at several other points.

Expected to Make "Cleanup"

During this trip Mortimer went to Forbes at Coronado Beach, Cal., told the party he was going to be appointed secretary of the Interior after Albert B. Fall resigned and that "we all will make a big cleanup" on contracts in connection with reclamation work. On another occasion, Forbes, Mortimer stated, presented a medal with the relief of President Harding, on one side, to H. F. Alexander, who had entertained the party on his new steamer "Alexander" on a cruise from San Diego to Puget sound. Mortimer declared Forbes in his presentation speech asserted that he acted on behalf of President Harding, but that as a matter of fact the director had no authority to make the presentation and was "called" for it after his return to Washington.
