EXCELLENT PROGRAM RENDERED AT CRESWELL

CRESWELL, Ore., Oct. 27.—The schools celebrated Francis Willard day on Friday afternoon with an elaborate, appropriate and very entertaining program. The assembly room of the high school was taxed to its capacity with the students from all the grades and high school together with their parents and patrons of the school.

Mrs. E. K. Barnes, superintendent, presided, and noted the need of the district for a larger auditorium. The program opened with a song by the first and second grade pupils. They marched in with imitation yellow leaf caps, singing, "October Leaves."

Miss Ruth O'Brien, at the piano, Marie Hodgketh gave a welcome recitation. The third and fourth grades had a song and recitation number, entitled, "Mr. Blacksmith."

"October Winds" was given by Alma Grouble and Marion Travillion. An exercise entitled "Jugs and Pitchers" was given by the first and second grades.

Carlissa May read a short biography of Francis Willard. Mildred Treanor read an article on Francis Willard's personality. Helen Magee told of the life of Theodore Roosevelt. Frances Scirbrough gave an instructive and comprehensive talk on the money wasted on tobacco. She made a blackboard outline having on one side two millions a year for tobacco and on the other side showing what two million years could do in a certain period of time. The results in churches, schools, homes and financial assistance to students and teachers was a telling argument to the waste in tobacco.
