DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 29.—Cut of 20 a pound in the price of butterfat quotation, effective at the Monday morning opening was natural in view of recent developments in the trade here. Open cut in the price of butter has been considered preferable to the secret rebates and slashes that have been so prevalent in the local territory during the last week or ten days.

The new selling price on print butter is 48c per pound for the better known makes. Cubes are down to 44c generally for extras.

Butterfat is quoted down to 51c pound for No. 1, Portland delivery.

EGG SITUATION RATHER QUIET
Egg market is rather quiet for fresh offerings. Demand continues mostly in storage goods and fresh stock is accumulating. This situation follows a generally easy mood in the Eastern trade.

CHICKEN DEMAND IS VERY KEEN
Demand for chickens is very keen in the local trade. There continues a shortage in most lines and in instances premiums are exacted in the selling price. Good Pekin ducks are being moved fairly well at 20c.

TURKEY OFFERINGS ARE HEAVY
Offerings of turkeys are of big volume at this time, with the general buying price from producers around 28c pound for No. 1 dressed, Portland delivery. According to E. L. Martindale, of Swift & Co., just received from the inland Empire, the crop is about the same as a year ago.

APPLE PRICES BEING SHADED
As an inducement to stock up with apples, wholesalers are offering retailers supplies at a further shade in price. Receipts here are enormous and the price is down to bedrock. Quality as a rule very good. Yakima and Wenatchee consigning liberally in carload lots.

CHINOOK SEASON NOW ENDED
In a review of the fish situation, the Portland Fish company says: "The chinook salmon season is now over. What few are arriving are of inferior quality. Silversides are in fair supply. On account of the Southern demand the market has suffered."

SUGAR PRICE IS CUT 20 CENTS
Further cut of 20c per hundred pounds is announced in the price of all grades of refined sugar by local wholesalers, effective at once. The following is a similar summary cut. The new basis for cane granulated is \$9.50.
