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## HOME COMING PLANS OUT

BIG INDOOR RALLY WILL BE FEATURE EVENT

Plans for the University of Oregon homecoming, November 23 and 24, will include a monster indoor rally the night before the big football game between Oregon and O. A. C., according to Haddon Hickey, general director, who announced the program of events last night.

All alumni, students, visitors and alumni of other colleges living in Eugene will gather at the Eugene armory where extensive plans will be held under the direction of a prominent alumnus and a corps of assistants. This will take the place of the rally following the homecoming after the noise parade. Last year the rally was held on Kincaid field and this year, as usual, speeches by variety coaches and prominent alumni, as well as a variety of yells and songs, will feature the program.

The program for the homecoming will start Friday evening with the bonfire being the first event. It is announced. Following this the noise parade will get underway. Prizes for the most effective noise making machines will be awarded campus organizations and it is expected that every student and alumnus will be in the line of march. Haddon Hickey will have charge of the parade and many new features are planned.

This year special attention will be paid alumni from colleges outside of Oregon and dinners are to be arranged for respective groups. These groups will also sit in the grandstand at the game under the colors of their schools and the homecoming will give them a taste of real college life impossible to obtain except by a visit to their alma maters.

The luncheon committee this year is planning for 700 more than last year for the affair Saturday of the week. Two dances, each larger than last year, will be given. Under classmen and visitors will go down town to the armory, while upper classmen and alumni will frolic in the woman's building.

An extensive athletic program is being planned by those in charge. It is hoped to schedule the Washington-Oregon football game for Friday afternoon and a soccer game Saturday morning with O. A. C. The annual cross-country run will precede the game Saturday afternoon.

5 BOOZE CASES IN COURT  
TWO FINED FOR BEING DRUNK WHILE DRIVING

Three Arrested Charged With Having Liquor in Their Possession at Dance

A. Bjerke and Anthony Tengs, local youths, were arrested Sunday night by Deputy Sheriffs Sidney Roush and Van Svarverud for operating an automobile on a highway while intoxicated and yesterday were fined \$50 and \$75 respectively for the offense. The reason Tengs was given a heavier fine, said Acting Justice of the Peace Harold J. Wells, was that the officers said he resisted them when they attempted to place him under arrest.

Bjerke and Tengs were driving a car on a side road west of Eugene and it had become stalled in the mud. People nearby telephoned to the sheriff that the men were drunk and making considerable noise.

John LaJoie, Ole Lindland and Loral Koons were arrested late Saturday night at a dance at Donna charged with having liquor in their possession. They were arraigned in the justice court here yesterday and pleaded not guilty. The time of the trial has not yet been set. Acting Judge Harold J. Wells allowed the young men to go on their own recognizance.

BUDGETS COME UP TODAY  
COMMISSION WILL HOLD THREE HEARINGS

Hearings on the 1924 budgets of the larger taxpaying bodies of the county will be held at the office of the Lane county tax supervising and conservation commission at the courthouse today.

The hearing on the budget of the Eugene water board will start at 10 a. m. according to Herbert E. Walker, secretary of the commission. This probably will last the greater part of the rest of the forenoon, he said, and possibly during a portion of the afternoon if there is any disagreement over the budget. ## FREIGHT BUSINESS GOOD

TRAFFIC MANAGER OF S. P. COMMENTS ON CONDITIONS

G. W. Luce Here From Company's Head Office in San Francisco, Accompanied By Wife

"Freight business is good hardly better," said G. W. Luce, freight traffic manager of the Southern Pacific company, with offices in San Francisco, who was in Eugene yesterday. He is accompanied in a trip over the Oregon lines of the company by Mrs. Luce and J. H. Mulcahy, assistant freight traffic manager of the company, whose office is in Portland. They arrived in Eugene early yesterday afternoon and spent the remainder of the day here.

"Yes, freight business is good on our lines," said Mr. Luce. The only thing that is bothering us now is that we have not enough cars to supply some of the shippers, but the demand for cars is so great that it is difficult to supply all the shippers with all the cars they need. However, the shortage is not serious and there is no great complaint as far as we are able to hear.

Mr. Luce said that in reading over freight figures recently he found that Eugene stands close to the top in volume of business furnished the company. He said that Eugene looks prosperous and that he has found in his travels over the company's lines in this state that there appears to be no business depression and that conditions seem to be very good in Western Oregon.

2 KILLED, 7 HURT WHEN AUTO HIT BY FIRE TRUCK

EVERETT, WASH., IS SCENE OF FATAL ACCIDENT

Firemen in Truck Responding to Alarm Collide Head-on With Fire Chief Taro's Car

EVERETT, Wash., Oct. 29. — Dennis Boyle, 55, a fireman, and Dan Michel, 58, a bricklayer, were instantly killed; Fire Chief W. A. Taro was probably fatally injured, and four firemen were severely hurt when a fire truck collided head-on with Fire-Chief Taro's automobile at 8:45 o'clock tonight at the intersection of Hewitt street and Colby avenue.

The injured firemen are Fire Chief Taro, a crushed chest and arm and other injuries. Ed Taro, 42, brother of the fire chief, slight cuts about the eyes and nose. Another brother of the fire chief, cuts about the head. Arthur Lealing, 28, cut left ear and skull.

Frank Healy, 26, compound fracture of the thigh. The injured residents are: Bob Dixon, 30, clerk of a cigar store, lacerated skull.

Harry Falk, 27, clerk cigar store, slightly cut by flying glass. Proves to Be False Alarm

At the time of the accident the fire chief and the combination truck were answering what proved to be a false alarm. The truck from the Riverside station was going west on Hewitt avenue while Fire Chief Taro was going north on Colby avenue.

Patrolman John P. Ryan, who was standing on the corner at the time, observed that the two vehicles were going to crash at the intersection and attempted to warn Fire Chief Taro. The truck swung to the right and the chief to the left, the machines crashing head-on.

Michel, the other victim of the accident, was standing on the corner. The chassis of the fire truck struck Michel and hurled him through a cigar store window on the corner. Fire Chief Taro was thrown from the car and taken to the hospital where it is not expected he would recover.

MILL OUTPUT STILL HIGH  
TWENTY PER CENT ABOVE NORMAL FOR WEEK

One hundred and thirty mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending October 29, manufactured 105,932,378 feet; sold 103,912,818 feet, and shipped 97,886,594 feet, says the weekly report of the association.

Production for reporting mills was 20 per cent above normal. New business was two per cent below production. Shipments were 6 per cent below new business.

Fifty-four per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 50,612,892 feet, of which 29,865,990 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 21,246,902 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 1414 cars.

Forty-three per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 41,878,968 feet, of which 30,958,836 feet moved coastwise and inter-coastal, and 11,018,332 feet overseas. Rail shipments totaled 1701 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 4,879,928 feet. Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 143,990,896 feet. Unfilled export orders 102,711,939 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 5115 cars.

In the first forty-two weeks of the year production reported to the West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 4,232,090,899 feet; new business 4,238,633,648 feet, and shipments 4,414,797,859 feet.

75,000 EMIGRATE TO CANADA AND UNITED STATES

GLASGOW, Oct. 8.—Seventy thousand Scots, most of them wrenched away from home by unemployment, have emigrated since the first of this year, the majority going to Canada and the United States.
