## LABOR SITUATION BETTER

### INDUSTRIAL ACTIVITY SHOWS MARKED INCREASE

#### Condition During Past Month Show Improvement Over Same Period Last Year

November has witnessed an increased industrial volume in the Pacific northwest when compared with that of the same month last year, according to the 4-1 monthly employment survey record here yesterday which stated that the number of men employed in outdoor industries, such as logging, lumbering and general construction work has been considerably greater than it was in November, 1924.

Good weather, the latter said, has proven no small factor in the increased activity.

General construction began to show signs of tapering off late in the month, but its logging and lumbering have continued at high levels, the latter stated. Lumber operations in the pine districts east of the Cascades are gradually being brought to the seasonal close, although winter camps there will start logging as soon as snow permits sleigh hauling.

Many of the fir logging operations will be closed for the holiday shutdown within the next three weeks, several companies having already announced early closing dates.

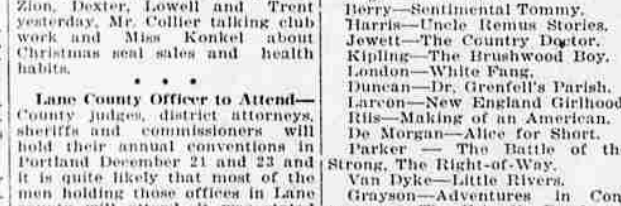
