### EULOGY IS DELIVERED

PROFESSOR FRANK SPEAKS AT SCHWARZSCHILD FUNERAL  
Former Member of University of Oregon Faculty Speaks of Life of Former Eugene Man

Professor F. G. Frank, formerly a member of the faculty of the University of Oregon, delivered the eulogy at the funeral of the late Edward Schwarzchild, formerly of Eugene, who died at Palo Alto, Cal., a few days ago. The eulogy delivered was as follows:

"As a friend of the man whose loss we are called upon to mourn, I am asked to say a few words at this time. It is customary and fitting that we gather for the purpose of paying our final respects, and we must hope that the study of such a life as the one just ended will furnish a lesson for the living.

"Edward Schwarzchild was born at Frankfurt-on-the-Main in 1847. In young manhood he came to San Francisco where he lived from 1869 to 1878, when he returned to his native land in impaired health. In 1883 he came again to America and lived in Eugene, Oregon, until 1925, when he came to Palo Alto with his daughter and granddaughter and here lived the few remaining years of his life.

"It was some 15 years ago, when I joined the faculty of the University of Oregon at Eugene, that I found the bookstore of E. Schwarzchild long established as one of the institutions of the place. I remember him as a venerable figure even in those days—thin but kindly—attending carefully to the assistance of his son and daughters to the demands of the faculty and students, yet ready when opportunity occurred for a chat or a discussion. It was evident that he had found time for general reading and for study in many lines. For example he was a linguist, reading and writing three languages, with a considerable knowledge of at least two more. It was, however, in matters of direct importance to the public welfare that he took most interest. He was a pioneer in urging a safe water supply for the town, and he served as a member of the board of education.

"Always ready to advocate a cause that he considered just, he was always fair-minded, and anxious to understand the other side as to defend his own.

"Edward Schwarzchild was a model in his family relations and lived to see children of two generations in careers of usefulness, and to these our sympathies are extended.

"To those outside his family circle, and especially to the many generations of students who lived for a time in old Eugene, it seems to me that the important recollection is of the man himself, of his benevolent personality exerted day by day for so many years.

"He spent his last days in peace and quiet and passed away as he would have wished, surrounded by his family with his mind clear to the end."

### ANIMAL CENSUS IS TAKEN

ESTIMATES MADE OF GAME AND PREDATORY BEASTS

Forest Rangers and Supervisor Macduff Submit Figures From Cascade Region

A census of game and predatory animals has recently been taken by the rangers in the Cascade national forest, and Nelson P. Macduff, supervisor of the forest, has compiled a report from the figures to forward to the forest office in Washington, D. C.

Mr. Macduff said yesterday that the statistics are but mere guesswork, but the estimates on the number of animals in the forest are in a measure he estimated from the number seen by the rangers and hunters and from the number slain.

Mr. Macduff said that he believed that deer are holding their own if not increasing. On a recent trip to Tire mountain and Mount Juno he saw in several different localities hundreds of deer tracks that looked as if flocks of sheep had passed over the areas where the tracks appeared to be the most numerous.

Statistics on game animals as furnished by the rangers to Mr. Macduff are as follows: Elk, 22; black or brown bear, 45. The estimate on predatory animals follows: Coyotes, 1000; wildcats, 1500; cougars, 200; wolves, 75. Figures on fur-bearing animals follow: Beavers, 200; foxes, 20; martens, 600; minks, 300; badgers, 30; ermine, 1500.

The number of animals killed during the year are enumerated as follows: By man—deer, 200, and black bear, 25. It is estimated that there were 1000 hunters in the forest. The report shows that it is estimated that 500 deer and five elk were killed by predatory animals during the year.

### MORE DIVORCES GIVEN

NEW CASE STARTED BY MRS. NORA POPE

Two Wives and One Husband Freed From Marital Ties By Court Decree

Jesse C. Meats yesterday was given a decree of divorce from Della Meats on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married in Albany, March 4, 1921. It was alleged that the defendant associated with other men. The father was given the care and custody of the two older children and the mother was allowed to keep the six-month-old baby boy.

Minnie Strook was divorced from Fred Strook on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. It was alleged that he was often drunk and that he abused her and called her vile and indecent names. They were married in Arkansas, October 7, 1925.

Ruth Korg was freed from Ernest Korg on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married in Eugene, November 23, 1922. The plaintiff was allowed to resume her maiden name Ruth Yeager.

Nora Pope started suit against Ralph Pope for a divorce. They were married in Pondleton, Ore., November 6, 1905, she says in her complaint, and she alleges cruel and inhuman treatment. L. E. Bean is her attorney.

### LOCAL OFFICER RETURNS

MAJOR BUBB BACK FROM SALEM; CHECKS LISTS

The army officer said that 15 reservists had been present and that he had given them an advance guard problem to work out. Considerable interest was manifested in similar activities in Eugene at the work, and Major Bubb plans later date.

At this time both Major Bubb and Staff Sergeant McKay are busy checking over the lists of reserve officers in this district and getting the names and addresses up to date. This is an important detail for mobilization plans and will take some time to finish.

RABBITS AND CAVEYS MAY BE LISTED IN CITY

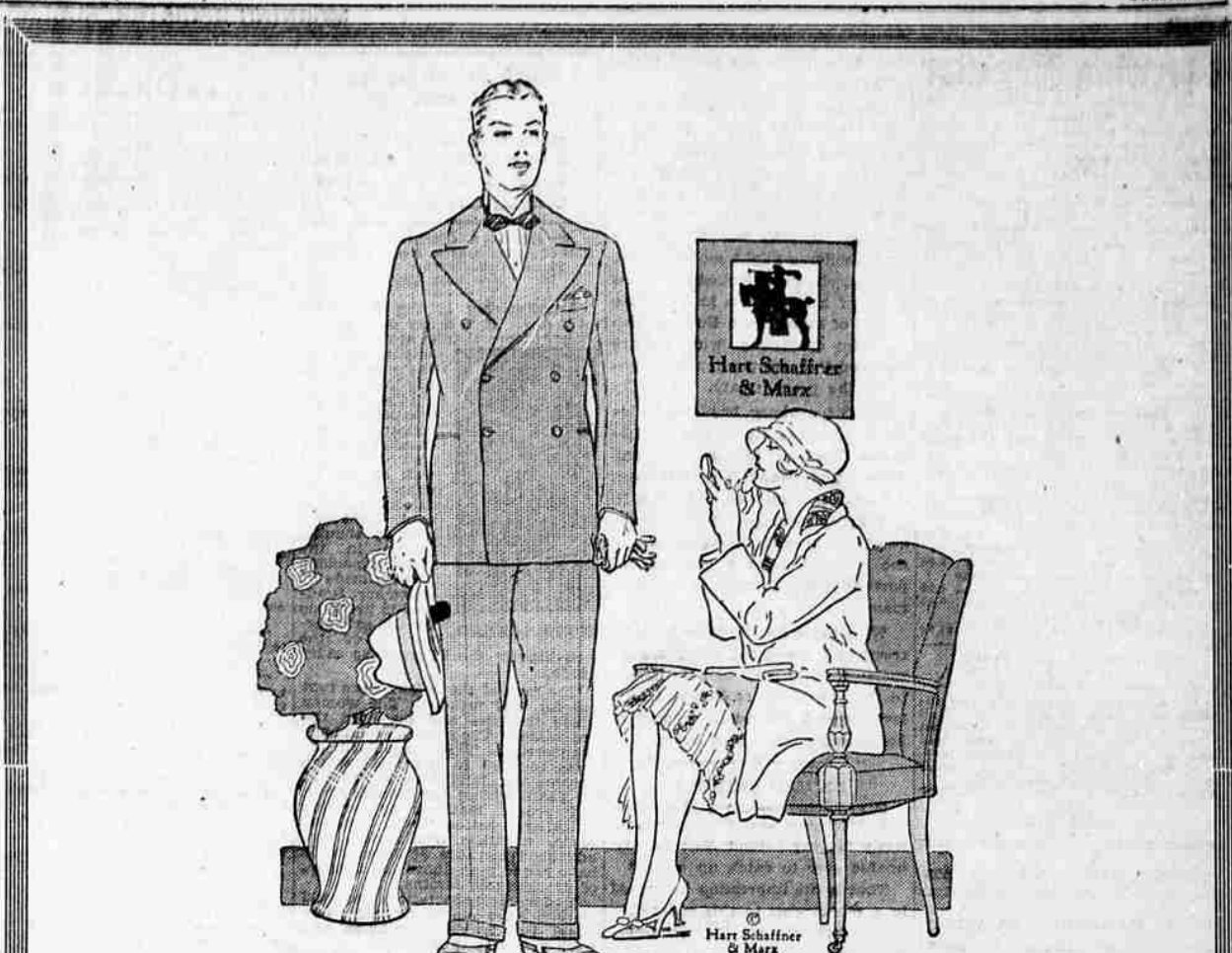
### LOCAL RESIDENT DIES

BROCCOLI YIELD HIGHER ROSEBURG MAN SAYS ACRE-AGE NOW DOUBLED

The broccolli crop near Roseburg has brought as high as \$400,000 annually to the growers it was stated.
