But Hindenburg has kept his word. He has stood for the Locarno treaties, for a new and friendly understanding with France, for co-operation with the allies in re-shaping Europe for disarmament all around, for opposition to the monarchy, for a genuine opportunity for democracy in Germany.

With the signing of the Locarno treaty in London, the allied and associated world may well tip its hat to that gruff old soldier and as a level-headed statesman, a man of honor and a fairly good sport.

BEHIND AMERICA

Paul Loebe, president of the German reichstag, sees Europe "hopelessly lagging behind America and unable ever to catch up again."

That is the impression he gained in a recent visit to this country. He attributes our lead to America's "gigantic technical development" and its capacity for business organization.

American ability to do business in a big, organized way assuredly has gone beyond German capacity. This was probably inevitable. But it is Germany's rash plunge into the big war adventure that gave America her present primacy in this field.

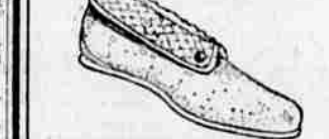
