RELIEF WORK IS PLANNED

VALVATION ARMY FUND TO BE RAISED HERE

Entertainment to be given in the Armory Friday Night, December 11

Extensive plans are being made for the concert to be held at the armory Friday night, December 11, for the benefit of the Salvation Army relief fund, according to W. C. Yoran, general chairman.

Mr. Yoran is sending out a letter to a large number of people in the city, calling attention to the work that is being done by the Salvation Army among the needy. The letter follows:

"Dear friend: The poor, the needy and the distressed are always with us. In Eugene and throughout Lane county the Salvation Army has been working for these far more than any other organization. Funds for this work are needed and heretofore they have been raised at various times, in various ways, and from various sources. It is now proposed to raise a fund for relief work throughout Lane county through the agency of a concert to be given at the Eugene armory, Friday, December 11. This concert is being sponsored by the Masonic, the Elks and the O. I. I. fellows lodges of Eugene, the Kiwanis club and the Pottery club of Eugene, and the Lions clubs of Eugene, Cottage Grove and Springfield, also by the American Legion and musicians' union, each organization furnishing a feature of the evening's entertainment. The price of admission has been put at the low figure of 50c and it is thereby the purpose of giving value received for the money taken in, every cent or which will be spent for relief work in Lane county."

"That you may know what the Salvation Army is doing and the need for such a fund, the following report of their work in Lane county during the past year is submitted:

"All cases coming before the Salvation Army are thoroughly investigated and no aid is given in unworthy cases. This will be in the nature of a community chest fund and has the hearty endorsement of the organizations above listed, as well as many others, and this circular is sent out by the committee composed of one from each of these organizations."

TRAFFIC MAN IS MAJOR

W. H. ELLENBURG HOLDS COMMISSION IN GUARD

Machine Gun Officer Graduate of Benning; Conducted Instruction at Camp

W. H. Ellenburg, state traffic officer on duty here during the convalescence of E. H. Lister, is a major in the Oregon national guard and a "high private" in the recently organized system of the state highway traffic department.

As Captain Ellenburg has commanded a machine gun company in the 18th Infantry last year. Before a product of the recently conducted school for national guard, regular army and reserve officers at Fort Benning, he was one of the top notchers at the last encampment at Medford, held in June.

During the encampment Brigadier General George A. White, commander of the 32nd Infantry brigade, issued an order for Captain Ellenburg to turn his company over to a first lieutenant, take over his captain's bars and sew on a golden oak leaf. Then as Major Ellenburg he was instructed to take charge of the machine gun training for the 18th Infantry.

Major Ellenburg conducted this course of training throughout the encampment and during the last few days supervised the formation of a drill schedule for machine gun troops for the period of 1925-26 armory drill instruction.

He was well liked by the men under his command and all officers of the national guard with whom he came in contact expressed high esteem for the new machine gun officer of the regiment.

MILK REPORT IS GIVEN

DR. HELTERLINE TELLS OF CONDITIONS IN CITY

The report for November of Dr. L. G. Helteline, city milk inspector, was filed in the office of City Recorder George A. Gilmore yesterday. The report follows:

"Seventy sediment tests taken; inspected three creameries several times; inspected premises of 32 places where livestock is kept within the city; visited about 15 different farms that supply milk and cream in the city. The milk supply has been found to be much cleaner than it was 10 months ago and places where livestock are kept in the city have been improved considerably."
