

ORDER VACATING ROADS MADE BY COUNTY COURT

Routes Through Terminal to Be Closed For All Time

ORDER INCLUDES PROVISION

County Wants Use of Crossing at Rikhoff Place Until July 1 Next Year

The old Prairie road that extends through the new terminal grounds at the Southern Pacific was ordered vacated yesterday by the county court with provision that the Southern Pacific company allow the use of the crossing near the Rikhoff place, near Avard station, until the first of July, 1926. The order of vacating the several cross roads that extend through the terminal site also has this provision.

The reason for this action by the court is that the new Maxwell road that extends east and west between the Prairie road and the Pacific highway, a short distance north of the Rikhoff crossing, could not be finished this winter and it is quite necessary that the Rikhoff crossing be left open, it was stated.

New Road Improved

The new road that extends through the orchard tract along the south edge of the terminal site, taking the place of the old Prairie road, has been in use for several weeks. The shoulders on either side of the gravel surface are quite soft, and many cars have become mired down on that stretch since the rains began, but the road is being worked constantly, according to Edwin Tuiler, county roadmaster, and it is gradually getting better.

A pile driver is at work on a new bridge across a slough on what is known as the Hardy lane extension road that is to take the place

of several roads that have been vacated.

Another Petition Filed

Another petition for the proposed road along the west side of the Oregon Electric railway, from Avard station to the end of Sixth avenue in Eugene, has been filed with the county court. County officials said they did not know why this petition has been filed as former petitions on the matter on record and action will be taken when funds are available. The court asked road district No. 35 to levy a special tax for a part of the cost of this improvement and the county would match it, but an election was called and the matter will have to go over until next year, according to P. M. Morse, county engineer.

BRIDGE SPAN ARRIVES

DRAW TO BE ERRECTED ON NORTH FORK

Steel for the draw span of the state highway bridge across the North Fork between Cushman and Florence has arrived at the bridge site, according to word received by the Lane county court, and the span will be erected immediately. The steel was sent by the state highway commission.

Construction work on this bridge is now being rushed, according to Arthur Striker, county bridge superintendent, in charge. The white cedar lumber, which is shipped from Coos Bay, has about all arrived.

FILM ENGINEERS HERE

LAND IN "BRAES" TO BE SURVEYED FOR SITES

Architect and Supervising Engineer For Cope Corporation Arrive in City

Engineers and architects of the Cope Film corporation will be on the ground at the "Braes" this morning to begin a survey of the site for the moving picture studio and colony construction of which was announced here a few days ago.

William Lang, architect for the corporation, arrived in Eugene yesterday from Portland. He was accompanied by Eugene Kiesel, supervising engineer and "property man" of the concern. They will cooperate in the selection of sites for various buildings.

The plot must be surveyed and contours established for the purpose of the general construction scheme, they said last night. How large the building could be presumed and Mr. Cope indicated that it may involve two or three weeks of preparation.

The definite selection of a site for the administration building, however, may be made today, as Mr. Lang indicated that he planned to stake out the tentative site today. A local surveyor will accompany the engineers.

"We have been impressed with the site for the studio and believe it offers much in the way of advantages to us," said Mr. Lang. "The important features right now are the matters of water sources. There are several springs in the 'Braes' and we plan a storage reservoir for this utility."

Besides the administration building will be an enclosed studio and an outdoor stage, the latter to be used in the summer time.

A central heating plant will supply heat for all buildings, including the 14 bungalows that are to be erected for mechanics and other workmen.

YEGGMEN BLOW SAFE

LEABURG IS SCENE OF POST-OFFICE ROBBERY

Only \$25 In Cash Taken By Four Men; Stamps and Money Orders Not Molested

The safe in the postoffice at Leaburg was blown by yeggmens about four o'clock yesterday morning and \$25 in money was taken. No stamps or blank money orders were missing and no goods were taken from the store in which the postoffice is located, according to W. M. Clark, the postmaster and store owner.

The entire front of the safe was blown off by a heavy charge of explosive and the door was completely demolished, according to Sheriff P. E. Taylor and his chief deputy, Van Svarverud, who hurried to the scene after being notified by Mr. Clark soon after he discovered the robbery, about seven o'clock in the morning.

Persons living near the store heard the explosion but nobody made an investigation. A woman living close to the store said that she saw three men leave the place soon after the explosion and she told the officers that she thought they had better report it, but stayed in her home. She is believed to have stood watch in front of the store.

Four men were seen to enter a car parked near the church, west of the store, and drive toward Eugene after the explosion. The officers found beneath the church steps two cardboard boxes taken from the postoffice.

W. L. Brist, a Burns detective, who was here at the time of the robbery, is assisting the sheriff's office in the case.
