### STEWART DENIES REPORT

J. W. LILLIE RECOMMENDED  
FOR NEXT WARDEN

(By The Associated Press)  
SALISBURY, Dec. 3.—Denying  
the report current in Capitol  
circles here today that he had been  
tendered the wardenship of the  
Oregon Penitentiary to succeed  
Warden A. M. Dalrymple, James  
S. Stewart, special investigator of  
the state land board, declared that  
he had no intention of being an  
applicant for the office and under  
no condition would he accept it.

Mr. Stewart said that he recom-  
mended J. W. Lillie for warden  
and that he had advised Governor  
Pierce of his choice. Mr. Lillie  
is now deputy warden at the peni-  
tentiary.

Governor Pierce, while refusing  
to issue a statement relative to  
reported changes in the offices of  
the penitentiary, indicated that the  
conditions at the prison had caused  
him "considerable worry." It is  
said that the appointment of Lillie  
has been urged by a large num-  
ber of persons who have gained  
interviews with the governor.

Warden Dalrymple is expected to  
arrive in Salem this week. He has  
been in the east for several weeks  
attending a national conference of  
prison wardens.

### Autos Kill 35

### NEW TAXATION ADDED

Senate Expected to Accept  
Terms of Measure

### ELOQUENT APPEAL MADE

Technical Explanation Given By  
Finance Minister Fails to  
Make Impression; House  
Cheers New Leader

(By The Associated Press)  
PARIS, Dec. 3.—Premier  
Briand's appeal to the patriotism  
of all parties to unite to save  
France today brought about the  
adoption of the government's bill  
providing for inflation of the cur-  
rency to the amount of 7,500,000,  
and additional taxation  
ranging from 20 to 100 per cent in  
the chamber of deputies. This  
evening the finance committee of  
the senate adopted the text of the  
bill.

It is virtually certain that the  
senate will adopt the bill to-  
morrow. The vote was 229 to 257.  
It would constitute the fifth vote  
of confidence in the government dur-  
ing the lengthy session. The small-  
est majority in the voting which  
the government received was seven-  
teen—a vote of 246 to 229 on the  
inflation section of the bill.

### Briand Appears Tired

Premier Briand appeared before  
the house, having suffered a sleep-  
less night, tired and harassed, but  
he rose to heights of eloquence  
never surpassed in the history of  
French parliamentarians. Agree-  
ment that M. Briand is the only man  
in France who could have jumped  
through a measure of this sort  
against the temper of the house in  
the early hours of the morning.

### Much Sleep Missed

After M. Loucheur, the finance  
minister, had failed to impress the  
assembly with technical explana-  
tions, Briand mounted the rostrum  
and made his appeal. A voice in the  
right center was heard to remark  
sarcastically: "There goes the cello  
soloist." But the interrupting mem-  
ber, too, was observing before the  
premier concluded.

The chamber adjourned at 12:15  
p. m. and M. Briand had without  
a rest since six o'clock yes-  
terday morning, when he left  
London. But he was on hand when  
the senate convened shortly before  
three o'clock.

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### DRY FORCES CRITICIZE ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

SECRETARY MELLON REPLIES  
FOR ADMINISTRATION

Executive and Legislative Arms  
of Government Attacked By  
Reform Societies

(By The Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Criti-  
cism by prohibition organizations  
of the administration's enforce-  
ment policies was carried directly  
to the White House today and an  
assault, which has gained momen-  
tum in recent weeks, brought a re-  
ply from the administration  
through Secretary Mellon.

The action of a committee made  
up of representatives of 26 reform  
organizations was regarded by many  
as the first big effort in a fresh  
campaign by the drys directed to-  
ward both the legislative and execu-  
tive arms of the government and  
timed in advance of an anticipated  
drive by the wets in the forthcom-  
ing session of congress.

### Action Held Joke

Clinton N. Howard of Rochester,  
New York, chairman of the reform  
group which met here this week,  
submitted his conclusions to the  
White House in a communication  
describing enforcement results as  
a "joke" and a "national scandal."  
He said that the drys had been  
"never yet has definitely and un-  
reservedly committed his adminis-  
tration to the enforcement of the  
13th amendment as provided by  
his oath of office."

While this was on its way to the  
executive mansion, Mr. Mellon at  
the treasury asserted that the  
criticism of the reform organiza-  
tions was "unfounded and unjusti-  
fied," and declared that every ef-  
fort was being made to correct the  
evils in the situation.

### Bad Situation Admitted

"Of course, the situation is bad,"  
the secretary said, "but were there  
no violations there would be no  
need for an enforcement organiza-  
tion."

"I have read reports of the com-  
plaint made by the organization's  
meeting here and I do not know  
what they mean. The charges  
lack definiteness. They won't help  
us much in enforcement with such  
talk."

The criticism apparently was di-  
rected at the general enforcement  
results and the treasury, therefore,  
did not accept them as applying to  
the recent reorganization of the  
enforcement machinery by As-  
sistant Secretary Andrews.

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### MAYOR BROWN ATTACKED IN GRAND JURY REPORT

EVIDENCE HELD SUFFICIENT  
FOR IMPEACHMENT

Rev. Ambrose Bailey Tells of Al-  
leged Vice Conditions Found  
Throughout City

(By The Associated Press)  
SEATTLE, Dec. 3.—Evidence  
"sufficient to justify the removal  
of Mayor Brown from office, either  
by impeachment proceedings or  
recall," was reported by the King  
county grand jury today. Sheriff  
Matt Starwich was held responsi-  
ble for laxity of law enforcement  
outside the city, and County Audi-  
tor D. E. Ferguson was indicted for  
"misconduct in office."

Mayor Brown appeared before  
the grand jury several times to de-  
fend his administration. Testi-  
mony concerning alleged vice con-  
ditions in the city was given by the  
Rev. Ambrose Bailey, who made a  
trip "below the line" in disguise.

The grand jury made a brief ex-  
amination of the sheriff's office.  
Ferguson violated a statute  
which prohibits county officials  
using county employes for private  
gain, the indictment alleged. The  
charges against Ferguson resulted  
from the distribution of a cook  
book to prospective brides, for  
which work the auditor is said to  
have received compensation that  
he did not turn over to the county.

### DAWES READY TO FIGHT

VICE-PRESIDENT ARRIVES IN  
WASHINGTON, D. C.

(By The Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—  
Vice-President Dawes arrived here  
today from Chicago prepared to  
carry forward his fight for an  
amendment of the senate rules to  
prevent filibusters.

Mr. Dawes declined to make any  
statement regarding his plans and  
busied himself during the day re-  
viewing acquaintances at the capitol  
and the treasury. Tonight he  
and Mrs. Dawes were guests at  
the cabinet dinner given by the  
president and Mrs. Coolidge at the  
White House. Among the early  
arrivals at the vice-president's of-  
fice was Senator Underwood, Dem-  
ocrat, Alabama, who has intro-  
duced a resolution which would  
enable a majority of the senate to  
put an end to debate at any  
time. Senator Cummings of Iowa,  
former president pro tempore of  
the senate also called on Mr.  
Dawes and the vice-president saw  
Senator Moses of New Hampshire,  
president pro tempore, and a num-  
ber of other senators during a visit  
to the capitol.

### JURY DISMISSES YOUTH

JOHN SCHWINDT RETURNS TO  
HOME IN HILLS

### McMahon Gives Injunction

The injunction handed down on

### Business Below Approach

### BORAH BILL OPPOSED

ANTHRACITE COAL DIVISION  
HELD DANGEROUS

New York state chamber of com-  
merce today unanimously adopted  
a resolution disapproving the Bor-  
ah bill, introduced at the last ses-

ganization, if it appeared on the

### Former Senator Dies

OLD STRUCTURE CLOSED

Business Firm Cut Off By  
New Approach

### INJUNCTION IS MADE

Structure Must Be Abandoned and  
Torn Down is Warning Given  
By Attorneys for Store to  
Four Members

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 3.—  
(Special to the Register)—The ac-  
tion of the State Highway com-  
mission in completing and opening the  
trans-Willamette river bridge at  
Albany while an injunction was  
still in force against the completion  
of the approach on Ellsworth  
street is construed as contempt by  
the attorneys for W. A. Barrett and  
J. J. Barrett, Albany business men,  
whose suit against the Union  
Bridge company, an agent of the  
State Highway commission, resulted  
in the injunction.

Members of the State Highway  
commission, William Dwyer, H. B.  
Vanderzander, W. H. Malone and C. B.  
McCullough, are being served with  
notice by E. B. Seabrook of the  
firm of Maloney, Seabrook  
and Dibble, Portland attorneys, and  
Gale S. Hill of Hill and Marks,  
Albany attorneys. The charges of  
contempt of court are to be pressed  
against them.

### Bridge Taken Down

the bars and allowed traffic to

### Storm Hits Northeast

PROPERTY DAMAGE HIGH ON  
ATLANTIC COAST

(By The Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—The storm  
which swept the Florida coast  
earlier in the week and broke yes-  
terday over New Jersey and New  
York reached such an intensity to-  
day that the coast guard head-  
quarters at Asbury Park ordered  
a double patrol along the entire  
New Jersey coast tonight.

No loss of life was reported al-  
though the general property dam-  
age was high. The Connecticut  
coast was reached by heavy waves  
running before a rain laden gale.  
Beach structures at Connetquot  
were demolished and restaurants  
flooded. Marine police succeeded
