

6TH ANNUAL HIGH SCHOOL CONFERENCE OPEN TODAY

25,000 Students Represented By Delegates

JOINT SESSION AT 9 A. M.

Dr. Henry D. Sheldon Will Deliver Welcoming Address in Auditorium; Conference Divides

The sixth annual high school conference to be sponsored by the University of Oregon begins this morning at 9 o'clock with the leaders of 25,000 high school students of the state here to take part in the program. Indications received from the registration headquarters promise that the expected 500 delegates will arrive. The advance guard of the group arrived last night.

The opening of the conference will be a joint session of all the delegates in the music building promptly at 9 o'clock at which Walter Malcolm, president of the associated students will preside and address the delegates on "Conference Objectives." Dr. Henry D. Sheldon, chairman of the administration committee will give the address of welcome.

Three Groups Meet

At 10 o'clock the conference will divide into three groups, the Association of Student Body Officers, the High School Press association and the Association of Girls' League.

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CORVALLIS DELEGATION AT CHAMBER LUNCHEON

C. E. Ingalls, Newspaper Man, Is Speaker

HISTORY OF PRESS TOLD

Program Is Put on By Visitors; Eugene Chamber Takes In New Members

The Corvallis delegation of commerce was represented by 14 delegates at yesterday's weekly luncheon of the local chamber, at which C. E. Ingalls, editor of the Corvallis Gazette-Times and postmaster, described the development of printing and emphasized newspaper influence in the course of an address on "Community Development and the Newspaper." A week ago Tuesday, Eugene chamber sent a delegation to the Corvallis luncheon.

"The history of the world was changed," declared the Corvallis editor, "when in 1785, the London Times was founded." He explained that since that time, the great daily has been a powerful factor in governing the policy of England.

The paper was founded at a time when the policy of that country was the policy of the civilized world.

"Such is typical of the profound influence which the press has wielded all over the world, since its development in the last two centuries," he continued. "The London Times is regarded by the people of England as sacred." As an example of its power, Mr. Ingalls related the part it played in influencing the country to support Disraeli, great English diplomat, in purchasing the Suez isthmus, on which England later constructed a great maritime highway.

Printing History Outlined

In tracing the development of printing, Mr. Ingalls recalled the conditions before the printed word became common. He described the ceremony of transferring one of the few books of that early time involved as much trouble as the transfer of real estate does at the present time. Such conditions were not changed until Clayton introduced printing in England, about ten years before the establishment of the "Weekly News Letter," the world's first newspaper.

At the time of the American revolution there were 34 newspapers, according to the speaker, and since that time the number has rapidly increased until now there are used in practically every situation of life by all classes of people including statesmen, business and professional men and the laboring classes. Much of the present newspaper development has been the result of the example set by the New York Herald, founded by James Gordon Bennett, one of the world's greatest editors of all times, said Mr. Ingalls.

In conclusion, the Corvallis man declared that while the chambers of commerce did use the newspapers to some extent, this source of publicity was not used as extensively by the Eugene and Corvallis chambers as it should be. His talk, interspersed as it was by kindly humor, helped promote the feeling of co-operation between the two cities, and this was the purpose of his address.

Special music was furnished by the Corvallis delegation during the luncheon. Lyle Burnau, pianist; C. L. Beale, accordion; and Guy Craig, cornetist, took part in the program. All are students of Oregon Agricultural college.

READ DECLARED BANKRUPT

INVOLUNTARY PROCEEDINGS FILED IN COURT

Con S. Dillon Named as Temporary Receiver for Local Street Contractor

Involutary bankruptcy proceedings have been instituted in the United States court in Portland for George W. Read, local street contractor, who left the city November 14 after he had made an assignment for the benefit of his creditors. Con S. Dillon, manager of the Williamette Collection and Credit Service, has been named as temporary receiver for Read. Before Read left the city he made an assignment for the benefit of his creditors, giving his liabilities at about \$50,000 and assets practically \$40,000.

It has not been learned here whether or not the company which furnished Read's bond has decided to make any action regarding the turning over to Read more than \$13,000 in city warrants which it was claimed were not yet ready to be turned over and which had been assigned to the United States National bank.
