FRANCES WILLARD WINS

HEALTH CONTEST HELD AMONG GRADE SCHOOLS

Patterson Second With Highest Number of Pupils Using Individual Cups and Towels

The boys and girls in the six grade schools of the city recently competed in health contests carried on by the physical education supervisor.

Eleven health rules were learned by means of health games that were played during the physical education period every day for one week.

At the end of the week the supervisor and her assistants tallied up on results. They found that, due to the interest created through the health week program, more than 300 boys and girls had begun using their own individual cups and towels at home, thereby keeping colds and other infectious diseases from spreading from one member of the family to the other.

The Frances Willard school stood highest in results, having 82 pupils who quit using the common family drinking cup, and 193 who began using individual towels. These results are 30 per cent better than those obtained from a similar health week program carried on last year.
