The interest in these tests is so keen that the students can hardly wait until the results of the tests are tabulated and sent.

The physical education instructor is planning a series of basketball and volleyball games to be played during the noon hour beginning about two weeks. These games will be arranged between the various gym classes and will determine the class championship, at the same time providing an interesting time for the students who are compelled to remain indoors during the bad weather. Each gym class will be allowed to select the poster colored and placed. This is a group of boys and girls listening eagerly to a most approved Santa reading from his book the names of the children who have kept the health rules.

The seventh graders enjoyed a letter Wednesday from their former classmate, Charles Purcell, now at Florence.

The annual drawing of names for the exchange of Christmas presents took place Thursday at the usual afternoon opening exercise for the sixth and seventh grade pupils.

Students Attend Conference. Class to Compile a Book. Correct Speech Promoted. Anatomy is Class Study.

(Register Lane County Special) THURSTON, Ore., Dec. 5.—The delegates chosen to represent the school at the student conference at Eugene this week-end are: Dale Phetteplace, president of the student body; Winifred Endicott, athletic manager and president of the senior class; Maude Ittassel, girl basketball manager, and Laura Christopherson, Wayne Tallaferra and Clyde Hart, presidents respectively of the junior, sophomore and freshmen.

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Thursday afternoon the physiology class visited the scene of a hog slaughtering for some practical study of anatomy.

The class in English-3 has worked out a system of self-correction in classroom speech. The table of anticipated errors, with the number of points to be charged as a penalty for each, follows: double negative, 5; wrong verb form, 5; wrong case, 5; Ain't, 2; word repetitions (like, Mary, she), 2; vulgarisms, 1.

The penalty for receiving more than 20 points in two weeks is to be: (a) To write a theme one page long using the corrected form of the mistakes and to read it before the class; for continued use of the same wrong forms to write a two-page theme using the correction five times; or (b) To learn 20 lines of poetry for the first penalty and 30 for continued offense.

As a reward for improvement, bonus points will be given as follows: For between 15 and 20 demerit points, 3 points; between 10 and 15 demerit points, 5 points; and for less than 10 demerit points, 8 points.

Each four bonus points will add one per cent to the pupil's six weeks' grade.

Two members of the class will be elected for police duty each succeeding two weeks. The chairman of the committee which has directed out the system were Hugh Doollittle, Wayne Tallaferra, and Mary Clement.
