OUR FOREIGN RIBBONS Now a foreign peril has been discovered. It is the lavish distribution of decorations among American citizens. One of the United States senators has asked the secretary of state to furnish him with a list of all the Americans who have been so honored.

The idea is that foreign nations, especially France, went into this

business by way of deliberate propaganda, intending it as a means of favorably influencing American sentiment rather than honest recognition of conspicuous services performed by Americans.

This critical attitude will hardly please the American wearers of the war decorations. And if France, in her liberality with Legion of Honor ribbons, was actuated by any such practical motive as that attributed to her, she doesn't seem to have got much out of it so far, since the war.
