

OREGON STATE TEACHERS TO MEET THIS MONTH

Program Is Announced For Annual Gathering

FIRST SESSION ON 29TH

Prominent Educators Billed for Addresses on Topics of General Interest

Details of the program for the Oregon State Teachers' association as prepared by Miss Cornelia J. Spencer of Portland, president, Lean E. D. Rossier of the Oregon Agricultural college, secretary, and the heads of the various departments of the association, are now almost complete and the entire program will soon be ready for publication, according to announcement by E. P. Carleton of Eugene, chairman of a committee on information.

The representative council will meet on Tuesday, December 29, for the transaction of all business. On Wednesday morning the general assembly will meet to listen to addresses from Miss Mabel V. Wilson of the Seattle public schools, Dr. E. P. Cubberley of Stanford university, and Mrs. J. F. Hill, vice-president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers. Assembly singing planned.

Assembly singing will be under the direction of Supervisor W. H. Boyer of the Portland schools. Upper grade boys from Elliot school will give a dramatization of familiar songs under the direction of Miss Mabel Hurley, class room

teacher. Departmental sessions will be held Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning. The association will close its work with a general assembly Thursday afternoon, when addresses will be given by Fred W. Steiner of Pennington, representing the American Legion, Miss Wilson, and Dr. Cubberley. Third grade pupils from Hosford school will sing three parts songs under the direction of Mrs. Grace Williams McCracken.

Representative members of the faculties of the Oregon State Normal school, Oregon Agricultural college and the University of Oregon, well-known class room teachers, and city and county superintendents from all sections of Oregon have been assigned work in the departmental programs.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE IS NAMED YESTERDAY

Frank Eberhart, General Secretary, Gives Report of Association Conditions

Members of the nominating committee to select a list of officers for 1926 for the Young Men's Christian association, were named yesterday noon at a meeting of the board of directors held in the Osburn hotel.

This committee will report at the annual meeting of the Y. M. C. A. membership, to be held the second week in January. Officers of the organization will be elected then, it was reported.

Those on the committee are E. L. Keeney, L. J. Temple, J. O. Holt, H. A. Soules and O. A. Houghum.

Frank Eberhart, general secretary of the local association, reported that a check of Y. M. C. A. statistics shows an increase of almost 100 in the roster of the organization, 68 of whom joined the "Y" during the last year. The membership now stands at 202. The total number of people belonging to the Eugene Y. M. C. A. is 431, including the boys' department. Mr. Eberhart told the directors. A peculiarity of the report was that while there were 43 less boys in the Y. M. C. A. this year, the financial return was \$140 higher than it was at this time a year ago. This was caused by the fact that when the report was made for last year the cash return had not been made on the memberships until after January 1, 1925. REV. F. J. CLARK TO STAY

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH MEMBERS TO MEET

Pastor Requests Time For Other Work as Condition In Accepting Local Pulpit

Rev. Frederick J. Clark, who for the last year has been pastor of the First Congregational church in Eugene, has agreed to remain in the local pulpit for at least another year on practically the same conditions under which he came to this city.

As a consequence of this answer, there will be a special meeting of the church officials and members of this congregation at 8 o'clock. The request for time to conduct other work during the year, asked by Rev. Clark, will be granted, it was said last night.

Rev. Mr. Clark last year asked for a Sunday every other month in which to conduct special mission work in the field. This was granted and he remained. This year he has advised a committee he may not have to be away from Eugene on Sundays, but asks that he be given time off during the week at various intervals.

All of the church officials who have discussed the possibility of Rev. Mr. Clark accepting the pastorate of the First Congregational church for another year have been more than anxious that the minister's wants be conceded.
