He traced the work of this kind from the Ohio flood, which took a toll of 900 lives in 1913 and showed its progress up to the present time. He said, "The Red Cross has been organized as the official administrative agency of the relief work in America since 1917. In 1918, the organization took charge of relief work in 39 disaster areas, besides administering foreign relief as well."

Tornado Reaches Far
Uprooting towns and wrecking rural areas, the tornado which swept through the Middle West last summer from end to end and covered a distance of 600 miles, said the dean, bringing with it the first gleam of order and hope the American Red Cross was working in the devastated district a few hours after the tornado had passed.

"In administering relief," said the speaker, "the Red Cross recovers, clothing and medical and nurses' attention. After these fundamental needs have been supplied, local advisory committees are organized to begin the process of rehabilitation, which includes the slow process of investigation, organization and construction. There is also the problem of education, as well as social rehabilitation."

Local Committee Judges
Every case is judged by the local committee, on the basis of need, he pointed out. Supply of the American people, the family is permitted to do its own buying for whatever purposes it may deem fit. Rural relief was also an important work in the middle western district. Livestock was shipped in; crops were planted, and fences were restored.

INTERNAL PROGRESS IS MADE IN PAST 25 YEARS

Attorney L. L. Ray Tells of Advancement SPEAKS AT LUNCHEON

Social Progress Has Failed to Keep Abreast of Material Progress Says Speaker
"The history of the United States since 1900 has been largely one of internal progress," said L. L. Ray, local attorney, in addressing the chamber of commerce yesterday. "Twenty-five years of a century," Mr. Ray spoke in place of Irving E. Vining, president of the state chamber of commerce, who had been scheduled to appear.

Mr. Ray declared that the world little dreamed when its attention was directed to its island possessions after the Spanish-American war, and toward the Boer war in South Africa at about the same time, that out of these situations would develop the need for the construction of the Panama canal and for the Hague peace conference. Nor did the idea of the great war of 14 years later or the league of nations or world court permeate man's mind then.

Developments Noted
"The material progress includes the development of transportation and communication, the mechanical developments, tendency to large-scale industrial organization, and a more equal distribution of wealth," Mr. Ray pointed out.
