DAILY MARKET REPORT
(Oregon Journal Market Review)
Portland, Ore., Dec. 14.—Butter is selling at the market for the spring-like weather so generally prevalent all through the Pacific northwest at this time. Production of butter is being going at practically all points of this territory. The same appears true of the country generally. The price of butter is today producing its greatest volume of butter for the winter period.

Cut of 20 points in the price of all print butter, which became effective at the opening of today's trading, was to be expected in view of the increasing weight and lack of outside demand. With butter down 20 and butterfat values off 30 points, the weakness of the situation is apparent. Butterfat values drop more than butter oil when the market is unsteady. When the trade is firm and prices advancing, occasionally the quotation on butterfat is advanced to more than butter.

Veal Situation is Very Firm
Market for country-killed calves is very firm along the wholesale way with no

general change in the price list because of the normal arrival of goods for the week's opening. Hogs considered steady.
Potato Trading Very Light
Trading in the potato market continues very light. Primary points of the Pacific slope report a lack of orders. Nonimpaired buying price here remains around \$2.70 central for fancy goods. Jobbing prices are being shaded somewhat.

Onion Men Generally Hold
There appears little desire to let go of onions at Oregon primary points. Very little demand is shown and the buying price for carload lots is nominally around \$1.75 per box for best quality and size. Most wholesalers have their needs until after the turn of the year.

Cranberry Movement is Good
Movement of Oregon-Washington cranberries continues of excellent volume here with prices generally maintaining a level of \$1.14 per box for best quality and size. Eastern stock is extremely dull and rather depressed here at \$1.00 barrel of 100 lbs.

Orange market is holding in South; price better maintained here.
