However, it was learned at the armory here Sunday where the Bible Standard congregation holds its services once each week on account of lack of room in their hall, that Dr. Price would close in Portland on the 15th and on his way south to spend the holidays with his family, stop off at Albany and give them a short engagement, possibly holding over next Sunday evening.

Orders for 17,000 pounds have already been received and it is hoped, said Mr. Fletcher, that the entire carload will be made up in a few days. Five carloads have been received and one is now on the way.

This explosive is very popular with Lane county farmers. The government donates the materials which were left over from the war and the only cost is the amount which the powder company at Du Pont, Wash., charges to make it up.

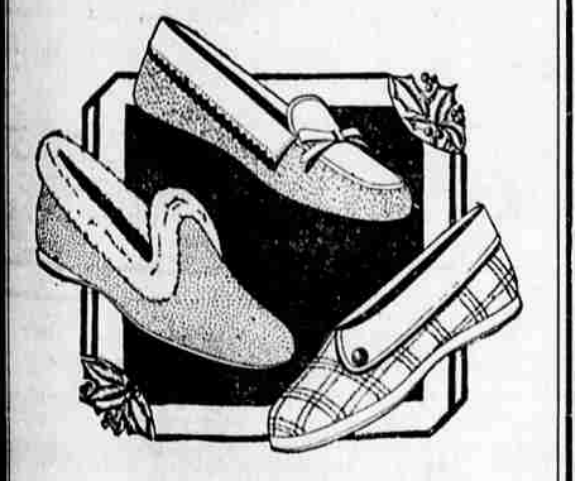
