PERMIT IS ASKED

PROVIDES FOR INSPECTION OF DANCES BY POLICE OFFICERS; OTHER REGULATIONS MADE

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Dec. 15.—The first application for a permit to have a dance hall to be made in Springfield, was made by Mrs. Emma L. Beck, of the Stevens hall. The council passed the ordinance at a meeting last night.

The law was passed to eliminate controversies similar to that raised last week when Paul Brattain, police matron, inspected a dance at the Stevens hall. The ordinance provides for inspection of all dances by a Springfield police officer or an officer of Lane county and states that the hall and stage at all times, and dances being prohibited. The penalty for violation of the ordinance shall be a fine of not more than \$10 and not more than 15 days in jail.
