

UNIVERSITY BASKETBALL TEAM MAKES TRIP SOUTH

Several Teams In California Will Be Played

REINHART MAY NOT GO

Squad Will Have Games All Way From San Francisco to Los Angeles Beginning Dec. 21

The University of Oregon basketball squad will leave here Saturday for California, where it will play a series of games during the Christmas holidays. Ten men will make the trip, it was announced yesterday by Coach Bill Reinhart. The Oregon quintet will meet the Spalding Bullets in San Francisco December 21 in their first game of the barnstorming trip and will complete their schedule with seven other games in California against high calibre club teams and college fives. The schedule has been arranged so that the members of the team will be back in Eugene January 4 for the opening of the winter term.

Reinhart May Not Go
It is very doubtful if Coach Reinhart will be able to make the trip south with the squad and the tour will be in charge of Ted Gillenwaters, veteran guard and playing manager of the quintet. Howard Hobson, two-year forward veteran, has been out of practice with injuries and it is improbable that he will be in condition to make the trip. However, five other lettermen will be taken along and, together with five new men to be selected this evening

after practice, Oregon should have a strong association for the southern invasion. However, term examinations are now on and intelligibility may keep part of the squad home.

While in Southern California the squad will be guests at the inter-sectional football game between Washington and Alabama, January 1, in charge of the tournament of roses committee. The management here also is in receipt of a number of letters from alumni in California offering to entertain the team while in the South.

Work on the varsity squad has been progressing rapidly and the three first teams on the floor each night in the Eugene armory already are beginning to show evidences of good teamwork. Coach Reinhart expects to have a great season this year and there is no reason why he should not, for he has lost but one man from the team that lost to O. A. C. in a play-off by only one point after having tied the Aggies for the Northwest honors last season.

HELP OF U. S. WANTED

DISARMAMENT SUCCESS HELD TO DEPEND ON AMERICA

(By The Associated Press)
GENEVA, Dec. 16.—The success of international disarmament depends in great measure on whether the United States collaborates, M. Paul Bonecour declared tonight to the Associated Press correspondent when asked his opinion regarding the prospects of disarmament.

M. Paul Bonecour, like Lord Cecil, has played a predominant role in the league of nations disarmament plans. His draft program study was the basis of the program approved by the league council, and he expressed tonight extreme gratification that even German newspapers praised his program as the first positive plan elaborated as a basis for disarmament negotiations.

"The fact that we have fixed a definite program on such a complicated and perplexing subject," he said, "is the first guarantee of our success."
