

THOMAS J. RODGERS IS KILLED BY AUTOMOBILE

Retired Farmer Struck In Confusion of Lights

DRIVER GIVES ASSISTANCE

J. Haskell, Operator of Car, Reports Accident to Police; Blames Headlights

Thomas J. Rodgers, 67, resident of Eugene for the last 13 years, was struck down by an automobile at Sixth avenue west and Madison street shortly before 7 o'clock last night and died three hours later at the Pacific Christian hospital as the result of his injuries.

The car that hit Mr. Rodgers was driven by J. Haskell, 608 Washington street, who reported to the police that he was driving west on Sixth avenue at a moderate speed and was blinded by the headlights of two approaching cars. He did not see Mr. Rodgers until the machine struck the man, Haskell claimed.

All possible assistance was given the victim, said Mr. Haskell, in his report Mr. Rodgers was rushed to the hospital in an ambulance and expired without having regained consciousness.

Mr. Haskell was not detained by the city police.

Mr. Rodgers resided at 581 Madison street and was a retired farmer. He formerly lived near Harrisburg.

Two daughters and three sisters survive. The daughters, Elizabeth and Dorothea are students at the Oregon Agricultural college. They were sent for last night and arrived just a few minutes after Mr. Rodgers died.

The sisters are Mrs. Matilda Ayres, Mrs. Hulda George and Mrs. Keziah Young, all of whom reside near Harrisburg.

No funeral arrangements were made last night. The remains were taken to the Veatch chapel.

PHARMACY IS ROBBED

LOVE AND UNMASKED THIEF ROBS LEMON-O STORE

Night Clerk Flees Revolver in Hands of Customer When Change is Sought

Pointing a gun at the night clerk of the Lemon-O pharmacy, 1249 Alder street, a lone and unmasked robber last night stole \$29 from the till of the cash register and two checks of uncertain amounts from the safe.

The hold-up occurred at about 9 o'clock. According to the story told to Policemen Scott and Williams who made the investigation, the bandit asked for a package of cigarettes. He tendered a 50-cent piece and as the clerk turned to make the change the thief ordered him to turn around.

As the latter turned he looked into the muzzle of a .38 caliber revolver in the hands of the desperado, who then took all of the money in the cash register and directed the clerk to lie down in front of the safe.

The two checks stolen were unidentified. Police did not learn the name of the clerk.

APPLICATIONS FOR \$281,000 WORTH ON HAND

City Recorder Gilmore Makes Report to Mayor E. U. Lee; Districts Canvassed

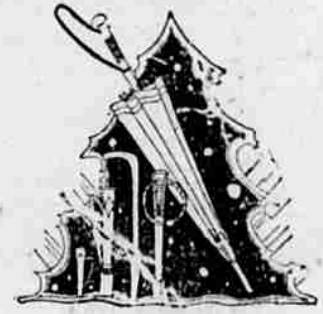
