TAX LEVY TO BE HIGH

7.4 MILLS INCREASE OVER RATE FOR LAST YEAR

School Tax Boosts Total; New Bratton Building One Cause of More Expense

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Dec. 17.—An increase of 7.4 mills in the tax rate of Springfield over the rate of last year was brought out by tentative calculations made public for the first time today.

Springfield's total tax rate for 1925 will be 7.4 mills according to the tentative calculations. Adoption by the taxpayers of the county budget figures making the county tax 25.3 mills will make the rate official.

The table shows that the increase in the total Springfield rate is due to the school tax, which has been boosted to provide for the payment of \$12,200 on the Bratton school, and for increased running expenses. The increase in the school district rate is 2.3 mills.

The city rate has been lowered six-tenths of a mill because of the increase in the assessed valuation and a decrease in the estimated budget expenditures for the year.

The assessed valuation for Springfield including public service property, is \$1,088,228, as compared with \$1,085,293 for last year.

The tentative county levy, as set by the assessor for the approval of the taxpayers in annual meeting, is 25.5 mills.

For the purpose of comparison of Springfield's valuation with those of other communities, the following figures are given: Coburg—\$70,912; last year, \$64,544.

CHAMBER MEETS TODAY

IMPORTANT MATTERS TO COME BEFORE BODY

First Meeting Under H. J. Cox. Recently Elected President of Organization Will Be Held

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Dec. 17.—The last and probably the most important business meeting of the Springfield chamber of commerce to be held this year is scheduled for Friday evening when many matters will be brought up for the consideration of business men.

Confirmation of the appointment of standing committees made by President H. J. Cox, and the outlining of a program of activity for these committees is among the most important actions to be taken up according to Mr. Cox.

The industrial committee appointed by President Cox is to cooperate with the town committee appointed to have charge of the large tract of land recently leased from the city of Eugene and offered as free sites to desirable industrial concerns for development.

This committee also is in charge of the investigation and promotion of plans for modern and added hotel accommodations in Springfield.

The publicity committee probably will immediately make plans for preparing data to be submitted to the Oregon state chamber of commerce dealing with the Springfield industrial sites. This material will be given publicly by the state chamber of commerce, and it is in this way expected to get in the hands of men backing industrial concerns seeking a location in western Oregon.
