Clerk Bryson Goes to Portland—County Clerk R. S. Bryson went to Portland yesterday to attend the annual meeting of county clerks from over the state.

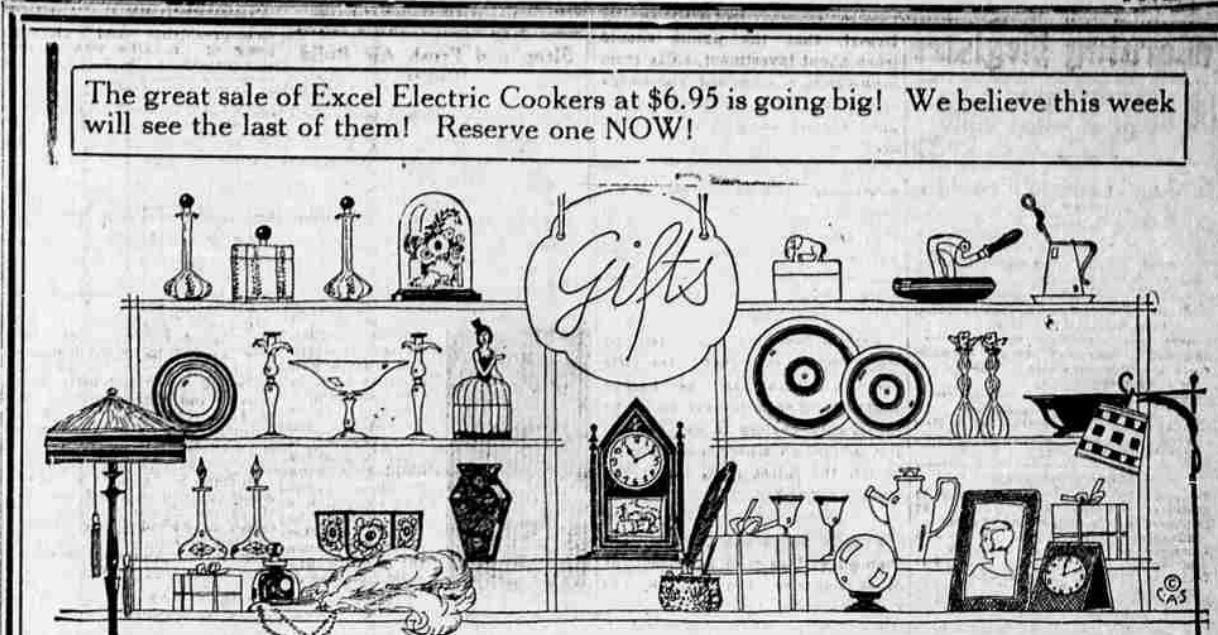
