AMERICA INVITED TO ARMS PARLEY

that, if an American delegation should be sent it would require a large technical staff of army, navy and civilian experts.

Portions of the text of the invitation which was signed by M. Scialoja, president of the league council, follows:

"A result of a long and continuous study which it has devoted to this question, the council is unanimously of the opinion that owing to the political, economic and technical complexity of the problem, which it raises, the question of disarmament can hardly be approached with any certain hope of complete solution unless it is considered in its entirety and with the co-operation of all nations. The matters for examination touch upon all the aspects of the ques-

tions and affect the interests of all nations of the world; and the methods and justification for dealing with them should, in the council's opinion, be not less universal. On these general grounds as well as on the more special grounds of the importance of the United States in such matters, the council attached the greatest possible value to the co-operation of the government of the United States, not only in the conference which it is its intention to call together but also in the preparatory work which in its opinion is indispensable for the success of that conference. The council believes that the time has come for studying the practical possibilities for the reduction and limitation of armaments under the guidance and responsibility of the governments and expresses the hope that at the moment when all the nations of the world are conscious of a common need, it will be able to conduct the full and direct co-operation of the government of the United States for a work which so closely coincides the peace of the world."

OLD ACTRESSES LENDING ZEST TO LONDON SEASON

ELLALINE TERRISS HAS RETURNED TO STAGE

Dame Ellen Terry, Well-Known to Americans, Is Not Playing But Visits Theatres

(Correspondence of the Associated Press) LONDON.—Three old actresses are adding color and interest to London's theatrical season.

Little Venno, who sixty years ago came to the Haymarket, is appearing with Sir Gerald Du Maurier, Marie Tempest, Gladys Cooper and Henry Ainley in Barrie's "Shall We Join the Ladies?" at His Majesty's theatre.

Seven years ago, ill health drove Ellaline Terriss from the stage, but she has returned and is starring with Seymour Hicks, in "The Man in Dress Clothes."

"An actor can never be happy without work—at least an old time actor cannot," she said. "I am afraid the actors of the younger school think more about golf and society than they do the stage. There is a tendency nowadays for actors to walk through their parts in the easiest way possible and avoid large theatres where they have to raise their voices and work really hard to get across."

Dame Ellen Terry, so well known to Americans through her many appearances with the late Sir Henry Irving, is not playing, but still is a frequent visitor to the theatres. Her eyes still have the sparkle which endeared her at Portia and she carries herself with the same regal grace which distinguished her work on the world stage for nearly half a century.
