CONDUCTOR IS KILLED
CHARLES P. HALL, GROUND UNDER TRAIN WHEELS
Body of Man Well Known in Eugene Identified Only by Metal Bag and Papers
Charles P. Hall, Oregon Electric freight conductor, who is well known in Eugene, was probably instantly killed at Multnomah station near Portland last night when his body was ground under the wheels of a passenger train.
Mr. Hall, according to word received here, left his home at Multnomah station a few minutes before the accident. The body was identified by the traveling bag and papers he carried, and which were found near the scene. He was due to take a freight train out of Portland for Eugene at 7 o'clock.
No one knows how the accident occurred, according to word received here last night. Apparently Mr. Hall attempted to board the passenger train en route to the depot, as it passed by his home. He was married and is survived by the wife and a child, it is believed.
Mr. Hall made trips to Eugene on alternate days, laying over here every other day.

MOLES, GOPHERS KILLED
EXPERIMENTS WITH CYANIDE APPEAR SUCCESSFUL
Poison Used on Fred Robinson's Place Near Creswell as No New Signs Appear for Several Days
Results from the use of calcium cyanide in exterminating gophers and moles on Fred Robinson's farm near Creswell has been quite satisfactory, said O. S. Fletcher, county agent, yesterday.
Mr. Fletcher and Roy Fugate, assistant state rodent control leader, a week ago yesterday used the cyanide dust in the runways of gophers and moles on the place. Mr. Robinson went over the land where it was used Sunday and again on Tuesday and found no evidences of the animals working, but yesterday he found fresh signs. Mr. Fletcher said that it is not improbable that the animals came in from adjoining fields.
While the results thus far appear to be quite satisfactory it is as yet only an experiment, said Mr. Fletcher, but it looks quite encouraging and the work will be continued.

CHRISTMAS BOXES FIXED

The boxes will be sent parcel post today to hospitals at Walla Walla, Portland, American Lake, Boise, and in Arizona, according to a report made last night by officials of the two organizations.
