Coast Conference Officials Meet In Spokane

Billy Reinhart, university basketball coach, will leave today for the annual meeting of the basketball Pacific Coast intercollegiate conference which will be held in Spokane Saturday night and continues for three days.

The purpose of the meeting will be to endeavor to make basketball rules, officiating, courts and accessories uniform in the northern division of the Pacific Coast conference.

In order to work out a uniform code of rules which it is hoped will be followed by officials and coaches in the Northwest and the Pacific Coast an invitation to all high school coaches has been extended.

Bain, principal of the school and coach of the squad this afternoon at the regular weekly assembly of the Springfield high school. He thanked the players for their hard work and willing spirit in the past season. The team finished a rather unsuccessful season having won only one game out of six. Another

game was tied and four were lost. The graduation of the older men this year leaves but scant prospects for next season according to the coach.

REED AND JONES DRAW CORVALLIS MAN TAKES FIRST FALL IN MATCH

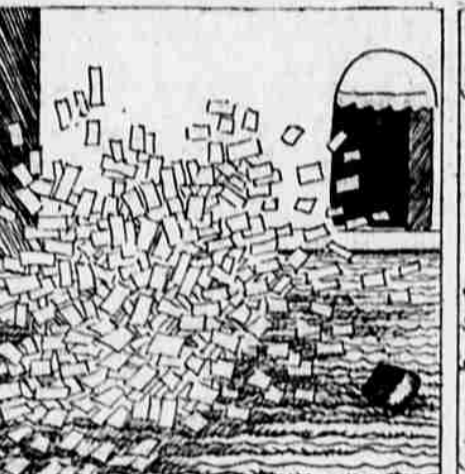
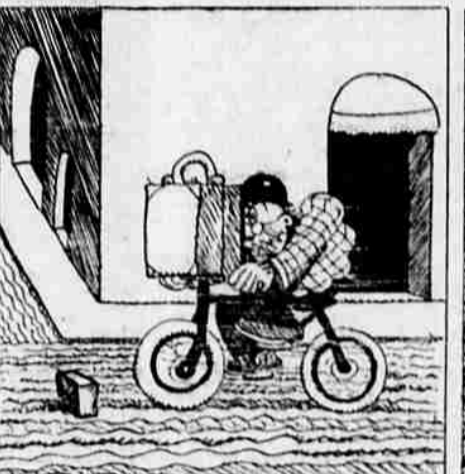

Eight Men on Trip to Pacific Southwest

Eight members of the Oregon varsity basketball team will embark this evening for California for a two weeks' barnstorming tour which will include eight games with representative quintets of the south. This is the first barnstorming trip since George Bohler was coaching at Oregon and the first in two years. The players will return to Eugene for the opening of the winter term

on January 4. The team will be guests at the East-West gridiron classic at Pasadena on New Year's day between the University of Washington and Alabama.

A severe blow to the varsity prospects came last Monday night when Howard Hobson, veteran forward, playing his last year for the team, twisted his knee in practice so severely that he will probably not be able to practice or compete this season. SLASH TO BE STUDIED

BOARD OF FORESTRY GOING TO MARSHFIELD (By The Associated Press) SALEM, Ore., Dec. 18.—To study slash conditions in the Port Orford cedar section of Coos and Curry counties, and make an attempt to arrive at some decision as to the proper methods of slash disposal there, the state board of forestry will spend today and Saturday in Marshfield and vicinity.

The meeting is considered of vital importance to loggers and foresters and was attended by many operators of the Marshfield district as well as forestry men of Portland and other points. Inas-

much as the slash disposal problem also reaches to land under administration of the department of the interior, two representatives of the department, E. J. Rands and W. S. Hoyer of Portland will be in attendance. Today the party will make a field trip investigating slash conditions and tomorrow the board will meet with all interested persons and endeavor to arrive at some solution of the problem.
