### CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MAKES PLANS FOR YEAR

#### Inter-City Bridge Is Main Work Contemplated

### COMMITTEES APPOINTED

#### Newly Elected Officers of Spring- field Group Function for First Time; H. J. Cox Presides

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Dec. 19.—  
Identification of committee appoint-  
ments and the outlining of a com-  
plete plan for the advancement of  
the town of Springfield was made  
at the meeting of the chamber of  
commerce, held Friday evening at  
which H. J. Cox, the newly elected  
president of the group, presided  
for the first time.

"The biggest thing the chamber  
of commerce wants to do now,"  
said President Cox yesterday, "is  
the promoting of the building of  
an inter-city bridge between  
Springfield and Eugene. The old  
bridge is practically worn out and  
in a few years will be unfit for  
service. There has been much talk  
among prominent business men of  
both Eugene and Springfield con-  
cerning the proposed bridge and  
a carload of materials was pro-  
cured, but other than that nothing  
has been accomplished. It is  
up to the interested citizens of  
Eugene and Springfield to make  
this bridge a reality." The com-  
pleted bridge will make the  
connection between the two cities  
much better and will cut off ap-  
proximately a mile from the present  
distance.

#### Mexy Given Place

M. H. Maxey, editor of the  
Springfield News, heads the pub-  
licity, convention, civic, educational  
and social committee with M. F.  
Hamlin, Springfield postmaster,  
and Dr. W. H. Polard. This com-  
mittee is planning an active cam-  
paign and a suitable publicity pro-  
gram for the industrial sites re-  
cently obtained by the city of  
Springfield from Eugene and  
a trade with the Southern Pacific  
company. More than 250 acres just  
outside Springfield was leased for  
a long period of years. The loca-  
tion is said to be ideal as an in-  
dustrial site for a combines prox-  
imity to the town with freedom  
from city taxation.

Obtaining suitable highways for  
Springfield along with legislative  
work for the city or county is the  
main function of the legislative,  
taxation, highway, fish and game  
committee appointed which in-  
cludes in its membership, M. M.  
Peery, retired druggist, and prop-  
erty owner; E. Morrison, man-  
ager of the Lane County Farmers'  
union in Eugene and prominent  
property owner of Springfield, and  
W. P. Tyson, commander of the  
Springfield post of the American  
Legion.

#### Industrial Committee Named

The trade, commerce and in-  
dustrial committee is composed of  
A. J. Perkins, property owner;  
Wesley Stevens, president of the  
Commercial State bank, and Dan  
W. Critch, of the Booth-Kelly mills.  
Its function will be to promote  
in every way possible the industrial  
and commercial welfare of the  
town of Springfield. This com-  
mittee with the publicity commit-  
tee will conduct an industrial sur-  
vey soon which will give statis-  
tics to be used for industrial pub-  
licity.

The housing committee is com-  
posed of W. F. Walker, mortician,  
and E. F. Eggiman, merchant. The  
meeting adopted a dues of one dol-  
lar a month for administrative ex-  
penses.

#### Sound Finance Wanted

The big problem of the finance  
committee will be to put the cham-  
ber of commerce on a solid finan-  
cial basis. The group which will  
work out this plan is composed of  
G. G. Bushman, mayor; H. F.  
Clarke, cashier of the Commercial  
State bank and W. G. Hughes,  
president of the First National  
bank.

The officers who took over the  
reins of the body at the meet-  
ing last Friday to serve for one  
year were: President, H. J. Cox;  
vice president, F. B. Hamlin, and  
M. J. McKlin, treasurer. William  
M. Gossler holds his office of sec-  
retary having been appointed to  
that position by the board of di-  
rectors. The new board of directors  
is composed of W. F. Walker,  
Julius Fulop, W. G. Hughes, W.  
F. Clarke, and W. C. Wright.
