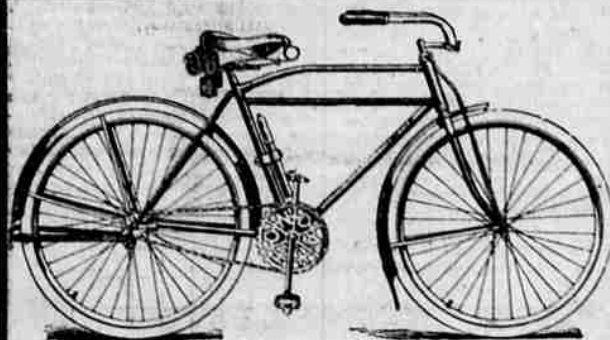

Brown Betty

This is a good, old-fashioned apple dish. Pare and chop six apples; place a layer of apples in a well-buttered pudding dish, then a layer of bread crumbs, sprinkle with brown sugar and cinnamon; repeat until the dish is full. Add several generous jumps of butter and pour sweet milk or hot water on until it comes within an inch of the top of the pan. Bake in a moderate oven until brown, and serve with plain or whipped cream.

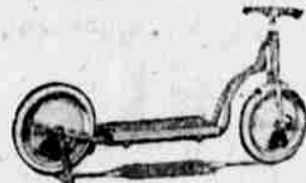

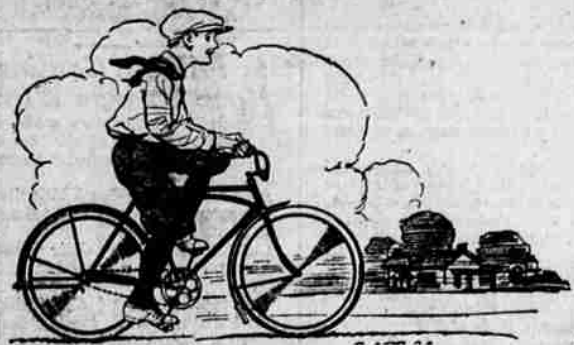

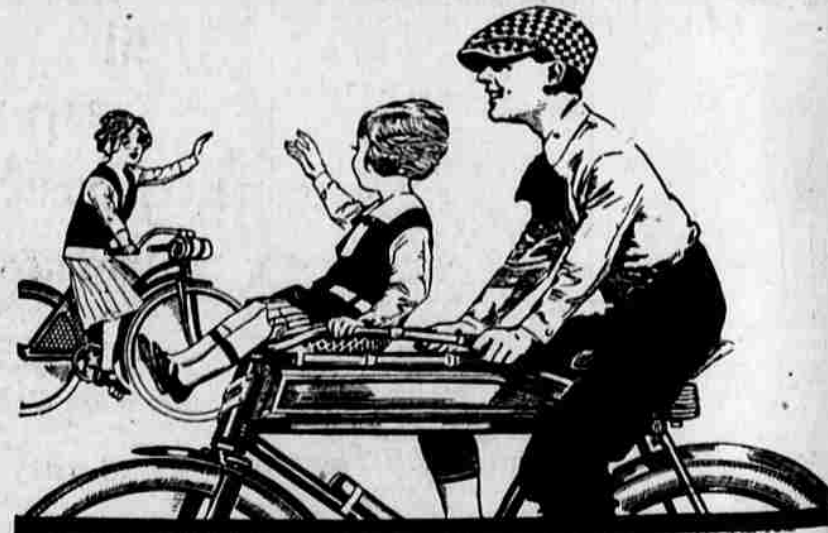
