CHRISTMAS SIGNIFICANT

BAPTIST PASTOR SPEAKS AT KIWANIS MEETING

Preservation of Christian Religion Important, Rev. Mr. Trawin Tells Members
Expressing the spirit of Christmas in a Yuletide message to local Kiwanians, Rev. Charles L. Trawin, pastor of the First Baptist church, was the speaker of the regular weekly luncheon held at the Osburn hotel yesterday noon. Rev. Mr. Trawin recalled the origin of Christmas in the birth of the two boys of especial observation in the Christian world, Christmas as the day of the birth of Jesus and Easter as the day on which his earthly career was concluded.

Members of the Pioneer boys' chorus, at the regular rehearsal period last night decided that a blue sailor uniform with white cap similar to that used by men of the navy, was the uniform they preferred to appear in at future public concerts.

Plans for financing the purchase of the uniforms will probably be taken up by those in charge of the chorus.

H. H. McAllister, assistant boys' work secretary of the Y. M. C. A. who was instrumental in the organization of the chorus and who was recently dismissed from the hospital where he was confined on account of an operation for appendicitis, was present at the rehearsal last night and was given a rousing welcome by the boys.

It was reported that there would be no more public singing until late in January or early in February. The boys were informed that they had an invitation to sing before the Portland Masonic lodges in Portland late in February and that if the chorus made the trip, all expenses would be paid. All schools of Eugene will close Wednesday afternoon for the Christmas vacation period. It was announced in the various local institutions yesterday.
