CITY TO BE OPERATING ON CASH BASIS SOON

Sale of Bonds to Clear Up All Warrants

ORDINANCE IS PASSED

Bids to Be Opened on January 11 \$175,000 Issue to Retire Outstanding Warrants

With the sale of the \$175,000 warrant refunding bonds authorized by the voters of the city at a special election a week ago and the sale of a large amount of bond refunding bonds covering public improvements as contemplated by the council, the city of Eugene will be doing business on a cash basis by the middle of January or the first of February, according to a statement by Mayor E. U. Lee yesterday. The mayor received his information from Fred Wentworth, city

treasurer, whose books show the condition of affairs in the city's finances. The sale of the warrant refunding bonds and the bond refunding bonds covering a large number of street and sidewalk improvement projects will amount to \$550,000 within the next few weeks, the treasurer's books show. This, it is announced, will clear up all outstanding warrants, not only in the general fund but those paid out to contractors on the improvement jobs. The ordinance providing for sale of the \$175,000 warrant refunding bonds was passed by the council at a special meeting yesterday afternoon. It provides that the bids shall be opened at a meeting of the council January 11.

THRIFT WEEK PLANNED

L. L. RAY TO HEAD LOCAL COMMITTEE AGAIN

Campaign Instituted by Y. M. C. A. Will Be Observed Here Starting January 17

Thrift week plans were made at a meeting of the local committee at the chamber of commerce last night when L. L. Ray, chairman of the city campaign administration last year was re-elected to fill that office for 1926.

Thrift week, sponsored by the Young Men's Christian association, is nationally observed. Representatives of local banks, stores, businesses and industries were present at the meeting last night. C. E. Lombard was elected secretary. Five committees were appointed as follows: publicity, George McMorran; schools, Orlando Hollis; churches, Frank Eberhart; finance, Morris Starbuck; speakers, Fred Strickland.

Observation of the event will begin here January 17, the anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin. That day will be "Share With Others" day. The remaining days of the week have been designated as follows: January 18, "Thrift Day"; January 19, "Budget or Home Economy" day; January 20, "Insurance" day; January 21, "Own Your Own Home" day; January 22, "Safe Investment" day; January 23, "Pay Your Bills" day.

There is also a ten-point creed which will be followed as slogans in the campaign, namely: "Work and Earn," "Make a Budget," "Record Expenditures," "Have a Bank Account," "Carry Life Insurance," "Own Your Own Home," "Make a Will," "Invest in Safe Securities," "Pay Bills Promptly," and "Share With Others."

RIVER THREATENS ROAD

CHANGE WILL HAVE TO BE MADE NEAR SPRINGFIELD

Water Has Reached Macadam at Certain Point Between Chase Gardens and City

A change in the road between the Chase garden district and Springfield will soon be necessary on account of the encroachment of the Willamette river upon it at a certain point, according to Clinton G. Hurd, county commissioner. Mr. Hurd said yesterday that the river has washed away its banks until a portion of the macadam of the road has been taken away at one or two points and it is extremely dangerous to drive by there at the present time.

The road for a distance of 60 or 70 rods will have to be moved back, said the commissioner. Just how far it will be moved from the river has not yet been determined, he stated. To build a breakwater on the river bank at that point to divert the water in another direction would be too expensive at the present time, in the opinion of the county commissioner.

MOTOR GROCERY STORES HIT BY NEW ORDINANCE

Big License Fee Is Proposed By Council

MEASURE IS INTRODUCED

Referred to Judiciary Committee by Mayor Lee to Check Over Before Passage

If an ordinance introduced at a special meeting of the Eugene city council yesterday afternoon is passed a yearly license of \$400 will be imposed upon the owners of the "motor grocery stores" that are now seen on the streets of Eugene daily and upon such other enterprises classed in the proposed "peddling and hawking" ordinance.

The ordinance provides a license fee, ranging from \$400 for these stores and other "peddlers and hawkers," designated as class 1, down to \$100 a year for lesser activities in that line.

Referred to Committee After its first reading before the council Mayor Lee suggested that the ordinance be come over by the judiciary committee before it is brought up for final passage.

The ordinance would license all peddlers and hawkers on the streets whether they use vehicles, are on foot or use doorways, recesses, alleysways or streets in the sale of their goods and wares. It exempts, subject to newspaper, magazine, Bibles and such publications.

EMERGENCY CLAUSE ATTACHED

It was stated at the meeting that the ordinance was drawn up at the instance of a committee from the merchants association. The ordinance carries an emergency clause and if passed will go into effect immediately. In the emergency clause the ordinance states that it is "necessary for the peace, health and safety of the public for it to be passed as the streets are now in a state of confusion, thereby endangering the lives of the people."

STREET CONTRACTS LET

COUNCIL GIVES JOBS TO SNOW AND MATHEWS

Thirteenth Avenue Pavement to Be Extended West from Monroe Street to Adams Street

One paving contract and two contracts for grading and graveling alleys in the city were let by the city council at a special meeting yesterday afternoon.

The bids on the paving of Thirteenth avenue west from Monroe street to Adams street, the grading and graveling of the alley between Onyx and Emerald streets and the grading and graveling of the alley between Olive and Willamette streets from Twelfth avenue to Thirteenth avenue were opened at the last meeting and the bids referred to the street committee. Yesterday the committee recommended that Oscar Snow be given the paving job and the grading and graveling job in the alley between Willamette and Olive streets, while A. C. Mathews was given the grading and graveling job in the alley between Onyx and Emerald streets.

SON RECEIVES PROPERTY

LOCAL ATTORNEY IS BENEFICIARY IN WILL

Henry Eugene Slattery, attorney of this city, is the principal beneficiary of the will of his father, Charles Henry Slattery, who died here a few days ago. The estimated value of the property of the estate is \$200, according to the petition asking that the will be probated. The will provides that \$200 shall go to a sister, Mrs. Helen Slattery, of Waverly, Ohio, \$500 to a son, Charles Lee Slattery, and the rest to Henry Eugene Slattery. The son here was named by Judge Barnard as executor.

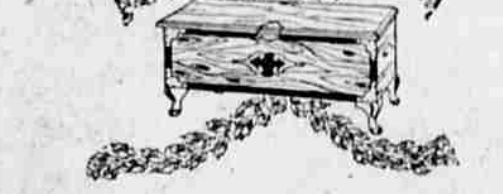
