### TWO DRAWS RESULT OF WINTER GARDEN BOUTS

Mac Lillard Fails to Hand Clarke Knockout

1000 FANS ATTEND CARD

George Dixon Outboxes Carl Miller in Second Battle of Double Main Event; Decision Boobed

Two draws resulted in the double main event at the Winter Garden last night in the semi-monthly card which 1000 fight fans attended. Mack Lillard of Eugene in the last bout of the evening's fighting tried desperately to hand K. O. Bobby Clarke of San Francisco a knockout but the best he could get was a draw. George Dixon, 140-pounder of Portland, weaved out of the way of Carl Miller of Eugene and went to a draw after some difficulty over a foul blow.

Bobby Clarke, who was knocked down four times by Lillard in their first meeting two weeks ago, came back with twice as much stuff and punched the Eugene boy to a fair draw. Lillard failed to get his knockout going and took just about as many as he gave. Time after time he rapped Bobby Clarke's head back with hard rights but with not enough steam behind them to put his opponent down. The fight became interesting in the second round and it looked like Lillard was going to get in some telling punches when he knocked Clarke to the floor with a hard right for the count of seven. After that Clarke was more wise and kept out of the way of Lillard's leads. Both mixed in at the opening gong but in the succeeding rounds Clarke danced around the outside of the ring with Lillard in the center, waiting for an opening. Clarke began working good in the third round and punched the claret from Lillard's nose. He got in some good clean blows.

Lillard looked as if he would be going in his old form in the fourth round when he pounded Clarke into the ropes with a fusillade of blows but none of them had the proper drive behind them. From then on the fight dulled with Clarke dancing around the ring, occasionally driving into Lillard in the center. The exchange of occasionally driving into Lillard landing some hard ones but getting jabs in return. They clinched often, both being about even at this game, with Clarke holding on most of the time. He was boobed continually by the fans for running away. However he played safe and as the final gong sounded he was retreating from Lillard's boring in because in the last flying of gloves the Eugene man was trying hard for a knockout. Both men weighed 122 pounds.

The second bout between George Dixon of Portland and Carl Miller of Eugene at 145 pounds was slow. Both fighters sparred through the ten rounds and failed to mix in. Dixon had the better of his opponent in cleverness with a crouching weave that baffled the husky Eugene boy, although near the end of the bout he was pounding Dixon out of it. Practically every round ended in a draw. The exchange of blows was even. Dixon, however, punched Miller repeatedly and weaved out of the clinch.

The decision aroused much dissatisfaction among the fans for the room was filled with cat calls and hissing for three minutes after. Referee Cal Hering announced the result. The fighters failed to mix. George Dixon, however, had the shade over the Eugene boy in boxing ability but he failed to back it up with a punch. Miller had a good punch but he failed to land it. Try as he would he could not get a hard drive on the brown boy. As the gong ended Miller was on his knees with a count of four from a shady blow of Dixon's. He sank to the floor near the end of the round and had to be lifted from his corner. The blow aroused some doubt but the decision was a draw. Slugging Honors Even

Miller evidently failed to get going. The knockout drive which he has used to floor his two former opponents was not as useful as it was formerly. They sparred for the biggest part of the contest, with Dixon as the aggressor. In the slugging which started in the third round the honors were even.

In the semi-windup Speed Landers, clever 114-pounder of Eugene, made short work of Les Anderson, 110-pounder of Portland in the most vicious bout on the card. He floored his opponent three times in the first round. The last was a straight right to the chin which toppled Anderson to the canvas as the bell ended the round. Referee Herman gaye the bout to Landers.

Peewee Bond, 114 pounds, of Eugene, waltzed through four rounds of no fighting, although repeatedly warned by the referee to mix in with Bobby Holk, 112 pounds, of Tacoma. The result was a draw. Ray Jacobs and Benny Devers, lightweight of Eugene, mixed it for a furious draw in the curtain raiser.

Timber Re-Cruise Approved (By The Associated Press) KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 22.—Over the strenuous protests of local timber men, the county court this afternoon passed the 1926 budget, in which was embodied an appropriation calling for the re-cruise of much Klamath county timber. Statements issued by the timbermen that \$20,000 spent in a re-cruise here last year had not been justified were branded "misleading" by County Judge Bunnell, who said re-cruise on 114 sections in adding 247,000,000 feet to the tax roll. 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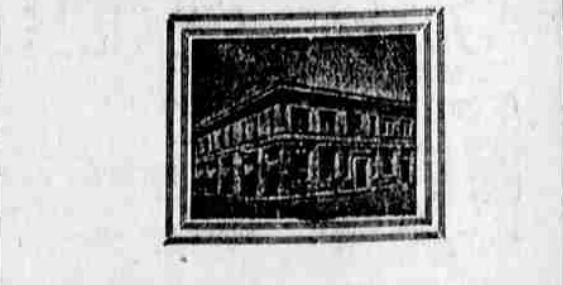
