Frank A. Munsey, who died at the age of 71 day before yesterday, rose from a farmer boy to be one of the country's leading publishers.

Mr. Munsey in best known as a newspaper player, the later years of his career as a publisher having been devoted to a very large extent to consolidating and eliminating superfluous newspaper properties.

Mr. Munsey, as careful readers of the newspapers will have noted, was still a bachelor when he died at the fairly ripe age of 71.
