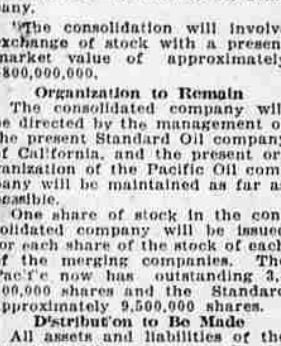
CARTOONIST IN TROUBLE

MISS ADA SHIELDS STARTS SUIT AGAINST FISHER

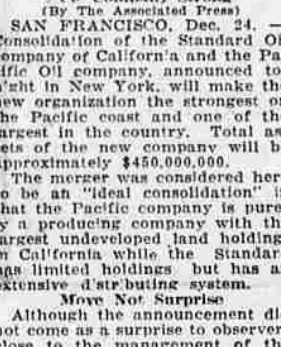

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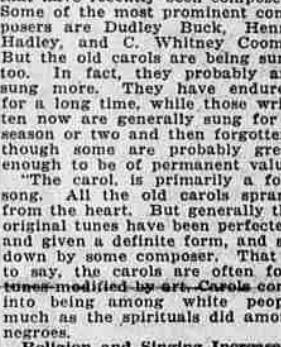
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
