U. S. AROUSES INTEREST COMMITTEE ON RUBBER GETS EUROPE'S ATTENTION

GENEVA, Dec. 24.—Considerable interest has been stirred up in Geneva over the decision of the United States congress to appoint a committee to investigate the world supply and distribution of raw materials which will inevitably find a place on the agenda of the proposed international economic conference.

Both Americans and Russians are to be invited to membership in the preparatory economic committee, and it now is suggested that the United States government may be invited to sit temporarily on the league of nations council number two. This council will act in a sort of advisory political capacity, both to the preparatory commission on the disarmament conference and to the economic conference preparatory committee.

League officials suggest that if the United States is interested in the equitable distribution of necessities like rubber, wood pulp and guano she could profitably join with certain European countries which are likely to insist upon discussion of the subject at the Geneva conference.

WOMAN HOLDS POWER MISS BELL AUTHORITY IN IRAK KINGDOM

LONDON, Dec. 24.—There is a woman who looms large in the Mosul controversy, although she strives to keep in the background. She is, Gertrude Bell, the right-hand "man" of King Faisal, of Iraq, who has many Arabian sheiks doing her bidding.

Faisal's kingdom, of which Mosul is a part, is a mandate of Great Britain. Miss Bell officially is known as the Oriental secretary to the high commissioner of Iraq. But in reality she is the chief British authority in that part of the world. She is a daughter of Sir Hugh Bell, ironmaster and colliery owner. She was educated at Queen's college, London, and St. Margaret's, Oxford. She was an military intelligence service during the war at Cairo and later became a liaison officer in the Arab bureau at Iraq.

Then she became assistant political officer at Bagdad and after that was established on the throne she took over her present position.

Miss Bell has written many books of travel and on politics. She is an accomplished linguist and an indefatigable traveler who has penetrated many of the least known parts of the Arabian desert and personally assisted in establishing the boundaries in a land unknown to the surveyor's sextant.

WHEAT ACREAGE LOWER AGRICULTURAL STATISTICIAN GIVES REPORT

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 24.—Washington's fall planting of 955,000 acres of winter wheat is 23 per cent less than the acreage sown a year ago, a report issued today by G. S. Ray, agricultural statistician of the department of agriculture here says. Of last year's planting of 1,240,000 acres, only 372,000 acres were harvested, due to extensive winter killing.

The area of 12,000 acres sown to wheat this fall is 20 per cent less than the 15,000 acres of last year, the report says.
