AUTO LICENSE RUSH ON

SHERIFF TAYLOR ISSUING
TEMPORARY PLATES
Seventy Make Application First
Day and Large Majority
Have New Cars

Yesterday was the first day upon
which applications could be made
at the office of the sheriff for 1926
automobile licenses. Only the own-
ers of new cars that have never
been licensed or previous licenses
this year are allowed to make ap-
plication at the office of the sher-
iff, all others being compelled to
send to the secretary of state.

Seventy applications were re-
ceived up to 5 o'clock yesterday
afternoon, according to Miss Beu-
lah Weaver, who has this work in
charge at the sheriff's office. Only
seven of the 70 were used cars, in-
dicating that many new cars are
being bought for Christmas pres-
ents.

NEW ROAD TO BE BUILT

Deeds for right of way for a new
road between Jasper and the Pleas-
ant Hill schools were filed for re-
cord in the office of County Clerk
Bryson yesterday. This new road
is intended to cut down the distance
between the two points mentioned
to accommodate many of the stu-
dents of the union high school at
Pleasant Hill who are now com-
pelled to travel much further than
they will when the road is com-
pleted. It will also accommodate
quite a number of farmers.

CROSSING OBJECTED TO

After a report had been made
by P. M. Morse, county engineer,
on the proposed crossing of the
Woodard Logging railway over
the Cottage Grove-London road the
members of the county court yester-
day expressed no objection to
the overhead crossing at the Wood-
ard mill, but objected to grade
crossing near the Shortridge bridge.

FIELD MEMORIAL PLAN

CHICAGO HISTORICAL SOCIETY
TO ESTABLISH CORNER

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—While two
clubby youngsters waited tonight
for Santa Claus they clung to some
of the toys their grandfather,
Eugene Field, the late poet, made
famous in his timely verses.
"A poet's corner" containing a
few of the personal effects of Mr.
Field, which have been held sacred
for many years by his widow in
the hope that their home would be
preserved as a memorial to her
husband, will be established at the
Chicago Historical society. The
old home is in the hands of wreck-
ers, making room for a new apart-
ment building.

THIEVES TAKE PAYROLL

SIX BANDITS KILL GUARD
AND GET \$17,000

PITTSBURG, Pa., Dec. 24.—
The Pittsburgh Terminal Coal com-
pany tonight posted a reward of
\$5,000 for the return of its \$17-
000 Christmas payroll, taken today
in a raid on the company's pay-
car by six bandits, who killed one
guard and wounded another. An
additional reward of \$1,000 each
for the capture of the robbers
was offered by the concern. The holdup occurred at
Mollenauer, a small mining town
near here and the bandits escaped
in an automobile.

YOUTHS TRY HOLDUP

THREE TRY TO ROB BANK AT
SCOTT'S MILLS
(By The Associated Press)
SALM, Ore., Dec. 24.—Three
youths, all of them said to be un-
der 22 years of age, at noon today,
made an unsuccessful attempt to
rob the state bank of Scott's Mills,
in eastern Marion county, and held
the cashier, J. O. Dixon, prisoner
for 45 minutes before they were
frightened away by the return
of thirty dollars, money collected
in a community Christmas fund
for poor children, was the only
loot secured by the bandits.

PAULSON GETS JUDGMENT

TEACHER HELD DISCHARGED
WITHOUT GOOD CAUSE

BEND, Ore., Dec. 24.—Mark
Paulson, deposed principal of the
Bend high school, was discharged
without sufficient cause by the
school board and is entitled to
judgment in the amount of \$2,430
for unpaid salary, according to the

filed in the office of the Deschutes
county clerk today. Judgment has
not yet been entered.

YOUTHS TRY HOLDUP
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SCOTT'S MILLS
(By The Associated Press)
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for 45 minutes before they were
frightened away by the return
of thirty dollars, money collected
in a community Christmas fund
for poor children, was the only
loot secured by the bandits.

The three youths, all armed
with revolvers, entered the bank
just after it had closed for the
noon hour and ordered the cash-
ier, who was working on the books
in a back room. All of the money
in the bank had been locked in the
vaults just a few moments before,
and when advised of this, and
after trying the doors to the vault
the bandits declared their inten-
tion to remain in the bank until
the time lock was released at 1
o'clock.

At about 12:45 o'clock, the tel-
ler returned from his lunch and
was met at the outside door by one
of the bandits who thrust a gun
at him and said:
"Stick up your hands and come
in here."
Instead of complying, the teller
backed up to the porch in front of
the bank and bolted down the
street to give the alarm.

The bandits then fled from the
bank and, entering a Chevrolet
touring car, drove northwest tow-
ard Monitor and Portland. Later
it was reported that the car had
been seen on the Pacific highway
in the vicinity of Barlow, but this
report could not be confirmed.

PENDLETON IS BALMY
