Local Pastor On Way East Wires Inability to Return to Eugene by New Year's Day

Plans for the New Year's day speaker at the Y. M. C. A. "open house" celebration were altered yesterday when it was learned that Rev. Frederick J. Clark, pastor of the First Congregational church could not return from the East in time to make his scheduled address.

Rev. Mr. Clark was announced recently as the principal speaker of the entertainment and program being arranged for New Year's day, but owing to a sudden call from Iowa, the nature of which has not been disclosed, the pastor left for the East before he had time to notify the Y. M. C. A. officials of his departure.

Yesterday afternoon a telegram from Idaho reached Frank Eberhart advising him that Rev. Mr. Clark would not be here for the occasion and expressing regret at the change in the program.
