MANUFACTURING PLANT TO BUILD STRUCTURES

Two Large Buildings Are Planned

LIONS CLUB APPROVES

Modern Machinery and Equipment Throughout Will Be Used in Completed Expansion

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Dec. 24.—Extensive improvements and enlargements of the Anderson Manufacturing company in now being planned, according to the manager, O. P. Anderson. The erection of two large buildings and the installation of more wood-working machinery are the two things that are contemplated by the company at present.

Recapitulation of the firm is now under way and once the improvements are made wholesale business in doors and window frames and other house material will be done on a large scale. It is announced by the manager of the local concern. The new plant will be erected at the corner of Third and F streets.

Building Plans Given

Plans of the firm call for the erection of one building 40x100 feet, and the other 60x100 feet. Several pieces of the most modern milling machinery will be installed in the new buildings in addition to a complete exhaust system, a complete and modern fire protection system and a new sidetrack, according to Mr. Anderson.

Experiments Carried On

Experimenting and cost finding in the products the enlarged firm expects to manufacture has been done by Mr. Anderson for the last two years. Recently a committee from the Lions club visited the plant and approved Mr. Anderson's plan for expansion. "When completed this new plant will be a modern and up-to-date factory and anyone interested is invited to inspect the plans at the present time," says Mr. Anderson.

ADMINISTRATORS NAMED

ESTATE OF JOHN CURRIE VALUED AT \$23,350

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Dec. 24.—The estate in Lane county of John Currie, Leaning farmer, who died a few days ago, is valued at \$23,350, according to a petition filed in probate court in Eugene, Tuesday, December 23. Ten thousand eight hundred of this is in property and cash in Springfield banks. The petition was made for the appointment of an administrator. Mr. Currie was the owner of another farm in Polk county, the value of which was not known.

Most of the estate in Springfield is in cash and the rest in personal property. His widow, Mrs. Martha Currie, was appointed administrator and Herbert F. Clarke, Dwight Kenney and Elise Pollard were named appraisers.
