LIBRARY IS POPULAR

FIFTY NEW READERS ARE ADDED LAST MONTH

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Dec. 26.—The Springfield library is busier now than it has ever been before at this time of the year. In order to accommodate the increase the library is being opened three times a week instead of twice. The change in opening days starts on October 1 and will continue to April 1. The days are Monday, Wednesday and Saturday instead of the usual Wednesday and Saturday.

An increase in readers is indicated by the 199 new names appearing on the list kept by Miss Roberts. These have been added in the last three months. In the past month, 50 new readers have been added to the list. Some days last winter the librarian loaned as high as 230 books a day. A record has been kept this year but will be released in the yearly report of the city librarian which will be out by January 1.

FOURTEEN CARS SOLD
