W. W. WILMOT ARRESTED

EUGENE HOTEL DEFRAUDED IN CHANGE HERE

Promoter of Ford Employee Banquets in Eugene Apprehended in Salem Yesterday

With the arrest in Salem yesterday of W. W. Wilmot, two alleged schemes for entertaining employees of the Ford Motor company agencies in Eugene and Salem, were frustrated and Wilmot will be brought back to this city today to face a charge of defrauding the Eugene hotel.

Claiming to be a representative of the western division of the public relations department of the Ford Motor company, Wilmot attempted to organize an entertainment for employees at the Eugene hotel and is alleged to have cashed a check for \$165 in that hotel.

No charge involving the check, which is said by Lane county authorities to have been drawn on the Ford Motor company of Detroit, naming a Detroit bank, has been made. A message reported to have been sent from here to the Ford Motor company brought a reply to discredit Wilmot and said that he was not connected with the company.

Wilmot approached the Salem Ford dealers with a proposal that he sponsor a banquet in a Salem hotel the guests to be all Ford employees in that city, according to dispatches received in Eugene last night. The expense, Wilmot credited with saying, would be borne by the Ford Motor company of Detroit.

This scheme is practically the same the prisoner is said to have begun in Eugene.

Elaborate preparations were made and arrangements for a five-act vaudeville program from Portland were included. Dime ads were made in Salem for full page advertisements in the newspapers.

Salem dealers became wary and inquiries were made which resulted in Wilmot's arrest in a hotel by Deputy Sheriff Burkhardt. Chief Deputy Van Svarverud will leave for Salem this morning to return the accused to the Lane county jail.

TO STUDY MARKETING
SCHOOL WILL BE HELD AT STATE COLLEGE

Lane Men Have Promised to Attend; Intensive Course to Be Given

Ten directors of co-operating marketing concerns in Lane county have promised O. S. Fletcher, county agent, that they will attend an intensive school for directors and members of Oregon co-operative associations at the state agricultural college at Corvallis, February 1, 2 and 3, according to Mr. Fletcher.

History of co-operative marketing in Europe and America; economic basis of marketing; factors entering into price-making; reasons for organizing marketing associations; aims and purposes of co-operative marketing and some things that co-operative marketing cannot do.

Duties and responsibilities of directors will be studied the second day of the school. Several leading bankers and directors of large corporations of Oregon are expected to take part in these discussions.

Lloyd F. Peck claimed desertion and was granted a decree from Emily Peck. They were married at Eureka, Cal., June 13, 1916.

Sylvia Rathbun was given a divorce decree from Charles R. Rathbun on the ground of desertion. They were married at Salem, Idaho, May 27, 1919, and it was alleged that the act of desertion took place February 15, 1923. The plaintiff was given back her former name, Sylvia Robinson.

Gertrude Ward was granted a decree from Jesse Ward on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married at Knoxville, Ill., May 29, 1897.

Margaret Sample claimed desertion as grounds for a legal separation from Charles Sample and was given her freedom. They married at Vancouver, Wash., August 18, 1923.

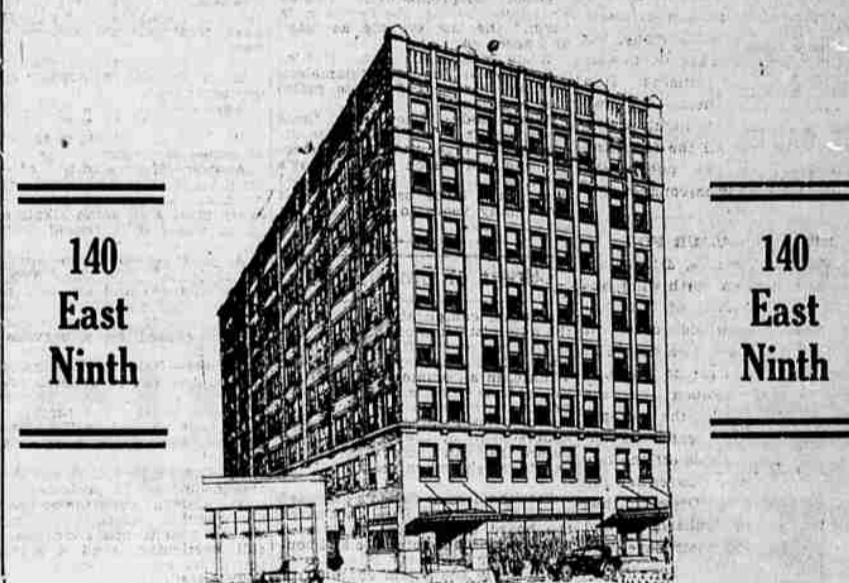
