

MAIN WRESTLERS READY FOR HARD GO TONIGHT

Winner of Match May Meet Portland Man

When Ralph Hand wrestles Bob Kruse in the main event of the card to be staged at the Heilig tonight at 8:15, he will be working for more than mere home-town glory. The winner of this match is promised a main go with either Ted Thye or Mike Yokel, both of Portland, at an early date, it is announced.

And as Thye and Yokel are rated as the two outstanding grapplers on the coast, a match with either one means much to a man who is looking forward to wearing the belt which designates the highest rank of a professional wrestler in his division.

Two other feature bouts are promised on this card, one a semi-windup between "Wildcat" Pete Reedsport, and Ted Brown, Chicago, and the other a preliminary between Mark Sanderson of Eugene, and Guy Lamb of Coquille.

The bout between Pete and Brown is another similar to the first, in that the winner will probably get a chance against the Corvallis favorite, Robin Reed, in a main event here.

The preliminary is between two husky young men of local renown, Sanderson, who tips the beam at 160 pounds will make his debut to professional wrestling ranks. He was a member of the wrestling and football teams of Eugene high school in recent years and is now aspiring to honors in the professional world. Lamb is equal in weight to Sanderson but nothing is known of his ability other than what he is capable of doing in his workouts.

Feature Stunt Billed

Another feature of the card will be a strong-boy-stuff act put on by Jack Wallace, a 15-year-old youth, who hails from Portland. The things this boy can do with his iron jaw are really spectacular, according to promoter Bill Dodelle.

This finishes a resume of the card which will be staged tonight. However, the matches will show what weeks of intensive training can do. Both men in the main go have been wrestling for years and have a world of knowledge in pain producing holds and have been going through strenuous afternoon workout sessions for the past three weeks. Hand has been working in the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium here including "Wildcat" Pete, while Kruse has been doing his stuff in a Portland gymnasium.

Reed to Issue Challenge

A telephone call from Robin Reed was received last night by Promoter Dodelle, he stated, saying that Reed would appear personally at the ringside to issue a challenge to the winner of the Pete-Brown clash. This will lend an incentive for both men to show what they can do, thus making this another battle to be remembered by local fans.

GREB TO MEET FLOWERS

NEW YORK COMMISSION RULES ON CHALLENGE

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Harry Greb, world's middleweight champion, must meet Tiger Flowers, negro middleweight, before he meets any other title contender, the New York state athletic commission ruled today in accepting a challenge from Flowers leveled at Greb's crown.

W. Miller, Flowers' manager, posted a certified check of \$3500 with the commission to bind the match.

The commission accepted the check, officially recognized Flowers as Greb's best logical challenger, and notified Greb that he must accept within 30 days or find himself ranked with the ineligible.

CLOSE GAMES PROMISED

COUNTY BASKETBALL TEAMS PLAY TONIGHT

The second round of the Lane county basketball league will be played tonight with the Comets scheduled to meet the Hounds in the first of a double-header to be held in the armory. The games tonight will start promptly at seven o'clock. The outcome of the Wendling-Gym game is doubtful. Neither team has taken a game so far and the winner tonight will probably free itself from the cellar berth in the conference.

Oregon Team Defeated (By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 29.—The Los Angeles Athletic club basketball team defeated the University of Oregon here tonight, 27 to 20, despite a hard fight staged by the college players in the last half of the game. The club men took the lead early in the contest, and held it, the score at the end of the first half being 14 to 6 for the southerners.

ALABAMA FOOTBALL MEN KEEP STRICT SCHEDULE

Players Feel Heat But Are Kept In Trim

(By The Associated Press) PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 29.—A rigid round of routine marked the hours between rising and retiring today for the Alabama university football team, which will meet the University of Washington eleven here New Year's day. Here is the schedule as it worked for two days:

Breakfast in a private dining room of their hotel; rest period; walk about hotel grounds; football conference; lunch in private dining room; rest period; workout in rose bowl; rest period; dinner in private dining room, "at ease," for an hour, bed.

Thursday the program will be varied just enough to put the workout ahead in order to give the Washington players a chance to try the rose bowl turf.

Coach Wallace Wade said: "The men are feeling the heat a little but not enough to slow them up materially." When informed that Karl Pape, Washington tackle, had been prevented from coming south by a tonsillitis attack, Wade expressed his regret with the hope that the loss of Pape would not hamper the Huskies.

Alabama being on the ground has held the center of the stage up to date.

Thursday Washington will arrive and the fighting aura that surrounds the Husky name is expected to push the northwest team to the front in popularity.

Twelve thousand tickets have been sold to date and 12,000 to 15,000 tickets are expected to go before the whistle starts on January 1.

CHAMPION BANKS TO APPEAR AT ALBANY SOON

Newell W. Banks, America's champion checker player, will appear in Albany at the chamber of commerce, about January 1, under the auspices of the Albany Chess and Checker club. He will give an exhibition in simultaneous and blindfold play, playing 20 boards of both chess and checkers simultaneously, and six boards blindfolded, all at the same time, also carrying on a general conversation during the play.

Mr. Banks was overseas, a member of the A. E. F. and while in Paris gave a similar exhibition and did not lose a game. Mr. Banks has never been equalled, in the opinion of experts, as a blindfolded player. He has played simultaneously as high as 20 boards blindfolded. Recently he played blindfolded 10 masters of the game, including Alfred Jordan, retired champion of Scotland and England, winning two and drawing eight which is said to be an unparalleled achievement.

The Eugene Chess and Checker club will be represented at the Albany meeting.

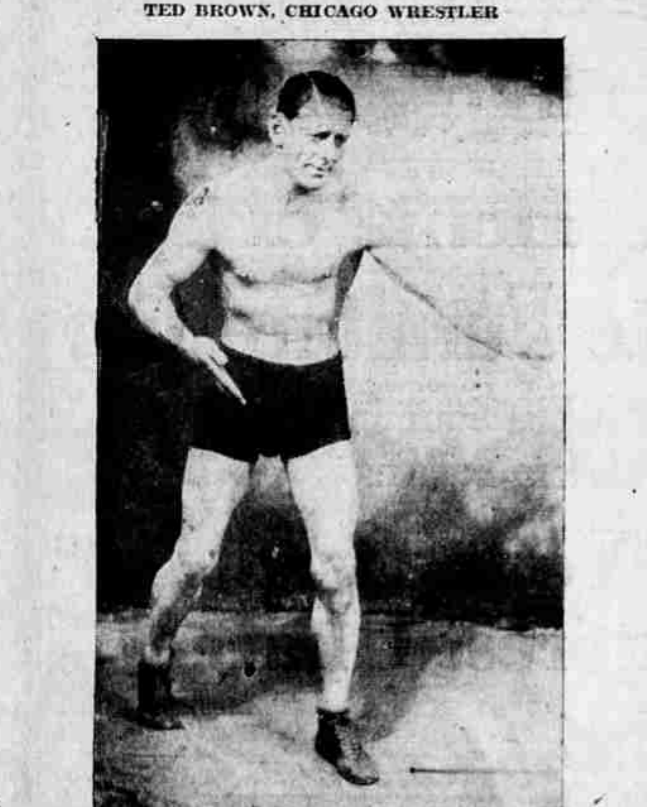
