SENDERS OLDEST MASON

JUNCTION MAN JOINED LODGE IN 1868

HARRISBURG, Ore., Jan. 2.—(Special to the Register)—An interesting bit of "Masonic lore" for this vicinity has come to light following the recent death of Judge E. M. Tandy, a resident of Harrisburg for many years previous to moving to Junction City 14 years ago, was credited with being the oldest living Mason belonging at any time to the Harrisburg order.

However, like Senders, now a resident of Junction City, had been associated with the lodge there, became a member of the organization here in 1862. Judge Tandy was enrolled on the order's books in 1868, six years later according to Judge Senders. It was he who taught Judge Tandy his masonry. At that time Mr. Senders conducted a store at Lancaster, between here and Junction, and Judge Tandy was practicing law at the village.
