COPE FILM STUDIO TO BE STARTED AT ONCE

Local Contractors Will Construct Unit

DARK STAGE IS FIRST

Thomas E. Hulme Here to Sublet Work in Order to Push Completion of Main Building

Construction of the first unit of the Cope Film corporation at "The Braes" will start at once. Announcement to this effect was made yesterday afternoon following a conference at which it was decided to sublet the contract for at least the excavation and erection of the foundation of the administration building.

Local contractors will be given the preliminary work and it is expected that the basement which will be 8 1/2 by 12 1/2 feet in length and depth, and from 15 to 20 feet deep, will be finished within a few weeks. This will include the pouring of a concrete floor and side-walls, and it is also possible that the local contractors will build part of the upper walls of the building.

Portland Contractor Here Details of this arrangement were explained by Thomas E. Hulme, Portland contractor, who arrived here Sunday night to confer with W. H. Cope, president of the corporation, and Eugene Kissel, consulting engineer and property man of the company.

Mr. Hulme, it was explained, has other work in Portland which will keep him from coming here for at least another 40 days and it was decided to sublet the contract in order to push the construction work ahead at once.

With Mr. Hulme was William P.

Laing, Portland architect who drew the plans for the administration building and other houses that will follow in construction at an early date. Mr. Laing yesterday modified these plans somewhat to conform with the location here.

Both men were impressed with the site at "The Braes" and although Mr. Laing had visited the location before, expressed delight in the possibilities "The Braes" offered, not only from a moving picture art viewpoint, but as a scenic location that may be developed into one of the most beautiful places in Oregon.

Mr. Hulme shared this view with Mr. Laing and said that he was deeply surprised even though he had been informed by his associates. Incidentally, Mr. Hulme, who has been a resident of Oregon for 33 years, made his first visit to Eugene Sunday night and yesterday.

It is expected that the entire plant in the first unit will be completed and ready for the first picture making late in April or the first part of May, according to statements made in the office of Mr. Cope yesterday.

The administration building, it has been pointed out, will house the main offices, the dark stage, laboratories, projection room and the central heating plant.

According to Mr. Kissel, the heating of all houses in the immediate vicinity will be done through the central heating plant by an underground pipe line system.

MARSHALL DANA COMING

PORTLAND MAN TO SPEAK AT UNIVERSITY

Townpeople Invited to Hear Writer; Mentioned for Place on U. S. Shipping Board

Marshall Dana, well-known Portland newspaper man and who has been prominently mentioned as a possible candidate for the office on the United States shipping board vacated when Bert E. Haney was not reappointed by President Coolidge, has been engaged as the speaker for the assembly of the associated student body at the University of Oregon, Thursday.

Announcement that Mr. Dana would come here was made yesterday when his acceptance was received by university officials. The assembly will be held at 11 o'clock Thursday morning and townpeople are invited to hear Mr. Dana. No admission fee is charged, it was recalled.

"Old Oregon and You" will be the title of his address, and while the topic will be particularly for university students, it was said yesterday that the talk would be of interest to people outside of the regular university life.

As this will be the first student body assembly since before the Christmas holidays, considerable interest has been taken in the announcement. The assembly will be held as usual in the women's building.

BREAK SCHOOL WINDOWS

BOARD OF EDUCATION OFFERS \$50 REWARD

TEXTBOOKS DISCUSSED

P. T. A. COUNCIL TAKES UP QUESTION

Superintendent Jones States Cost in California Where State Prints Them

State-printed school books were discussed at the meeting of the council of Parent-Teacher associations at the office of David John Jones, city superintendent of schools, yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Jones, as chairman of the committee on state-printed books, reported on the subject, citing California as an example where an excellent system has been established. He gave data on the comparative cost of textbooks in that state and in Oregon. For example, the primers used in the public schools of California cost 24 cents each and in Oregon the cost is 60 cents. He said that the first and second spelling books cost 28 cents each in California and 80 cents in Oregon, while the first year arithmetic costs 33 cents there and 65 cents here.

OLD HOUSE TO BE SOLD

BAPTISTS TO CLEAR LOT FOR CHURCH BUILDING

The large residence on the northwest corner of Ninth avenue east and High street, where the new Baptist church is to be erected, is being advertised for sale and will be moved off as soon as possible so that work on the church building may be started in the near future.

This house was built more than 35 years ago by the late Professor Mark Bailey, who was a member of the first faculty of the University of Oregon. It was the largest home in the city at that time and was considered a pretentious mansion in those days. It was bought by R. A. Booth and he and his family occupied it for a number of years. Later it was remodeled into an apartment house.
