A POOR ARGUMENT

One of the favorite arguments of opponents of prohibition is that more liquor is being consumed now than before the great drouth. That is an argument that can be neither proved nor disproved by statistics, but the average person of fairly observing habits has his own opinion. Just as an example, how many persons with the smell of liquor on their breaths are met in an average day now? And how many were met in the good old days of the saloon?

Another reflection of the tendency toward increasing aridity is to be seen in the custom of observing New Year's eve. It was once the custom to spend that night with the flowing bowl and the next morning in bed with a wet towel and a piece of ice placed where they would do the most good. There are still plenty of illit headaches on the first morning of the glad new year, but the number is small when compared with those of earlier years.

Enforcement of the prohibition law is still pretty much of a scandal. So, for that matter, is enforcement of the traffic laws. People who insist that they are perfectly good citizens flout both in a way that is shameful. And, unfortunately, they get away with it a great deal oftener than they should.

But it is silly to say that there is more drinking and more drunkenness now than before prohibition. There may be more arrests, but that proves nothing, for in the old days drunkenness was so common that no one thought of arresting an illuminated citizen unless he was making an exaggerated and pestiferous nuisance of himself, while now drunkenness itself is a cause for arrest.

All sensible people know that consumption of intoxicants is going down. It will decline steadily with the passing of the years. Prohibition is very far indeed from perfection, but it is showing results.

A RICH OLD AGE

Joseph S. Donovan, head of the Donovan Motor Car company at Boston, had an ambition to make a million dollars. In that he was not unique. Neither was he unique in his decision to quit when he had the million. But he has proved himself a man of determination and self-control in living up to his program.

Mr. Donovan, having got his million, is stepping out of the business at the comparatively youthful age of 45. He is in the prime of manhood. Very likely he could go ahead, if he chose, and make several more millions. It is the first million that comes the hardest. Any multimillionaire will tell you that.

But this remarkable millionaire believes that, having started in to earn his own living at 11 and kept at it for 34 years, he has a right to leisure and the enjoyment of whatever pursuits may look good to him. Also he believes that it is only fair for the man who has made his pile—enough to keep him and his family comfortably for the rest of their days—to step aside and give younger fellows a chance.

"I feel that I have done my share," he says. "And there are so many things I missed as a youth in the way of travel, pleasure and opportunity that I believe they are coming to me now. A number of men have told me they wished they had had the courage to do the same thing instead of going on with

their noses to the grindstone after there was any need of it."

Life is not only "more than meat" but more than work. Along with duty, it calls for ever-widening spheres of activity, experience, knowledge and self-development.

Youth is a time of preparation. Why should age not be a time of self-enrichment in ways previously impossible?

HUSBAND MUST PAY TAX

COURT DECIDES AGAINST ROBBINS EXECUTORS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 4.—Community property in California is so completely under the control of the husband that he can be required by the federal government to make a return on the entire income derived from it as his own and be compelled to pay the income tax upon it as a unit.

In handing down this opinion today, the supreme court decided against the contention of the executors of the estate of R. D. Robbins of California, that the treasury erred in requiring him to return and pay the tax upon the whole income derived from community property acquired before 1913.

The decision reversed a finding of the federal district court for north-

ern California, which upheld the executors' claim that they were entitled to recover from the treasury certain amounts of taxes paid, on the ground that the property belonged jointly to Robbins and his wife and that they should have been permitted separately to return and pay taxes on one-half of the income as belonging to each.

This would have materially reduced the amount of tax which the government would have received.

Estate Delayed 37 Years

Neglected Colds End in Nasal Catarrh

Fresh Air and Cleanliness, Assisted by an Alkaline Spray of Nasal Passages, Help to Cure This Malady

It is such a common ailment I'm not surprised at the number of letters I get asking about nasal catarrh. The causes, prevention and cure of this disease are in many minds.

Lining the nasal cavities is a delicate tissue called the mucous membrane. It is continuous with the lining of the throat and with the lining of the ear leading to the ear.

Opening into the nasal cavities are the nasal sinuses. This arrangement is made possible because the bones of the face are hollow. The spaces communicating with the nose. Lining these cavities and continuous with the lining of the nose is the same mucous membrane.

The mucous membrane is a soft and velvety structure. It is rich in blood vessels and contains many glands. Some of the latter throw out a watery fluid and some produce a thick mucus.

Any inflammation of a mucous membrane is called a catarrh. In the lining of the stomach, which is involved, the disease is called "catarrh of the stomach."

If the mucous lining of the bladder is affected, the trouble is called catarrh of the bladder. So when the lining of the nose is the location of inflammation, it is called nasal catarrh.

A common cold is an acute nasal catarrh. At first there is a flow of hot, watery fluid, because the congestion makes these glands—the serous glands—work overtime. After a while the more sluggish mucous glands become disturbed and there is a flow of thick, yellow sticky mucus.

But it isn't the acute catarrh, the cold, that we set out to describe. It is the chronic form we have in mind just now.

Chronic nasal catarrh is the result of repeated and neglected colds. One attack follows another. The mucous membrane becomes thickened and the glands never throw out quantities and quantities of mucus. It clogs the nostrils and drops into the throat.

To clear the throat and get started in the morning is a disagreeable job. The sinuses fill up with mucus, and to keep free from it requires almost constant use of the handkerchief.

Cleanliness is the first rule of treatment. But how to get to the bottom of the cavities and to free the spaces is a real problem.

When a catarrh has run on for months and years, the entire mucous lining becomes inflamed, hypertrophied, the doctors call it. The membrane is thickened on both sides of the nose, so much so indeed that the two sides are in constant contact. This chafing and rubbing causes increased irritation and more mucus.

In a good many of these cases there is no relief until some of the give space and to overcome the thickened tissue is removed by irritating contact. A spray of some agreeable alkaline solution will help.

Had teeth and tonsils and other cavities of the mouth and throat looked. Anything which lowers the vitality provokes the nasal catarrh.

Another time we will go more in detail. Today we stress the importance of fresh air and cleanliness of the nasal tissues, as preventives of chronic nasal catarrh.

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UNITARIANISM SUBJECT

REV. FRANK FAY EDDY BEGINS SERIES OF SERMONS

Liberalism Rises Like Irresistible Tide in Modern Life, Says Speaker

"Liberalism rises like an irresistible tide in our modern life, sweeping away old landmarks and altars, unsettling and confusing the minds of many who cannot escape its scientific demonstrations of facts, but who strive to hold onto some remnants of things held on faith which contradict it," said the Rev. Frank Fay Eddy, Sunday in the first of his series of sermons on "Modern Unitarianism."

"Unitarianism," the speaker said, "is one of the significant expressions of liberalism. It is an experiment in making a creedless church, founded in tolerance and giving wide freedom for individualism, which from the beginning accepted the authority of the human reason as the ultimate criterion and authority in religious faith. Naturally it has been more responsive to scientific liberalism than the churches which are constructed on a foundation of authority expressed in a holy church or a holy book."

Unitarianism is a focusing point in liberalism where liberals who are fired with missionary zeal are touched with emotion, come together to build a new altar to the God revealed in the revelations of modern science. Gradually and almost unconsciously Unitarians have come to the realization that there is more than a revolt of various individuals, but that they are altar builders for a distinctive faith with enormous social responsibilities toward the future.

"Our rejections are incidental, more casting aside encumbering baggage inherited from the traditionalism of the past, the natural but inadequate reactions of men with a meagre intellectual equipment and less accurate knowledge of the universe in which we live. Unitarianism is not rationalism nor yet liberalism, but it is rather a definite interpretation of a rationalistic liberalism, moving boldly and frankly the religious problems of our humanity."

Briefs of Oregon Life

The state of Oregon has the highest automotive license fee of any state in the union, according to figures compiled by Will H. Marsh, chief of the division of motor vehicles of the state of California. California, by the way, has the least of any state, with the District of Columbia rating lower.

In an effort to prevent further slides on the Columbia river highway about one mile east of Astoria, a highway engineer is planning to run for the operation of a tunnel through the hillside, according to an announcement made by Axel J. Olson, resident highway engineer.

George Huntington Currey, Jr., publisher of the Arlington Bulletin, and a former resident of Baker and La Grande, is planning to run for representative in congress against N. J. Sinnott, according to a news story in the Baker Herald.

With the bond postoffice assured of advancement to the first class by virtue of having amassed \$41,933.07 in postal receipts for the 1925 calendar year, a concentrated effort is to be made to secure the designation of a federal building for Bend this year.

Seeding of winter wheat in Oregon appears to be only about 92 per cent of the acreage seeded a year ago, says F. I. Kent, statistician, United States department of agriculture.

All records were broken in the collection of inheritance taxes in 1925, State Treasurer P. E. Kony announces. The total sum of \$510,890 collected is \$160,000 in excess of estimates at the beginning of the year and will to that extent relieve the deficiency of state funds that is predicted before the end of 1926.

In conference Saturday with Otto W. Meeker, chairman of the publicity committee of the Portland chamber of commerce, Walter E. Meacham of Baker, president of the Old Oregon Trail association, learned that no allocation from the Oregon development fund will be made this year in aid of Old Oregon Trail promotion.
