That there would be no changes in the method of handling the meat or delivering to customers was the statement made by Mr. Cook last night. The policy by the new owner will be to continue selling number 1 grade, he said. The only difference from the past operations, as far as the public is concerned, will be in the method of billing out. Customers may order meats with their groceries just the same, but will be billed for meats separately.

It was stated, however, that the meat department would be closed at 6 o'clock Saturday nights hereafter.

STUDENTS REGISTER AT U

REGISTRATION OF NEW TERM EXPECTED TO BE RECORD

Entrants Who File Late Registration Cards Must Pay Fee, Statement Says

Registration of students for the winter term at the university was held yesterday. The administration building was virtually filled to capacity throughout the day with students and new applicants who were turning in signed registration cards.

The total number of students for the winter term will probably reach the 3000 mark, according to estimates given out last night. However, no exact check has been made as yet, but from the crowds which formed at the various windows asking for blanks, this estimate is expected to be reached.

In giving yesterday as the day on which to register, it was not meant that students who arrived today or later are unable to gain admittance to the university this term, but that to do so they must pay a late registration fee, according to a statement made by officials of the registrar's office.

In all probability some students will use the entire week to complete registration. This will necessitate the withholding of total registration figures for a time, the registrar stated.
