ROADS ARE MAINTAINED
LANE COUNTY CREWS BUSY ON MACADAM

Recent Freeze and Wet Weather Has Made Surface Easy to Work With

The Lane county road crew under Edwin Tuller, county road superintendent, has been busy since the recent light freeze, maintaining various macadam roads. The freeze loosened the surface of the roads to such an extent that it can be easily worked and this, together with the rain, is then has had a beneficial effect.

Maintenance gravel has been spread on the Eugene-Lorane highway, the Eugene-Cottage highway, the Chase road, the Silk creek road west of Cottage Grove and several others in the southern part of the county.

The county rock crusher has set up at the Boyd pit on the London Springs road a mile and a half south of Cottage Grove and maintenance rock for the southern end of the county is being crushed at the plant.

A big set of powder has recently been set off at the quarry at Vida, loosening 2000 or 4000 yards of rock for the crusher there and the air compressor that operated the drills is being sent to the Boyd pit. Rock will be crushed at the Vida quarry for maintaining the county's portions of the McKenzie highway.

CLUB WILL USE SHOPS

FARM MECHANICS WILL BE TAUGHT HERE

Plan to Form Organization Among Farm Boys Announced by Collier

Plans are being worked out for a farm mechanics club among the farm boys of Lane county and the use of the shops at the Eugene high school two nights in the week has been obtained, according to Arnold D. Collier, county club leader. Mr. Collier is sending out a letter on the subject to those interested, explaining the project, as follows:

"Through the courtesy of the Eugene school board it is possible for us to use the shops at the Eugene high school for club work two nights each month this year. Fred Chess, head of the manual training department at the high school, has consented to be the leader of a farm mechanics club and has promised to give us the second and fourth Thursday nights of each month. It is our plan to offer a project for boys of the ages from 14 to 19 inclusive, who are interested in such things as soldering, vulcanizing, rope tying and welding, care of tools and cement work. To be a member of the club, the boy must secure permission from his parents and he must be on hand every night of meeting unless unavoidably prevented. The costs of the project will be only the cost of the materials, which the club member uses and should not exceed \$1.50.

"The Oregon Agricultural college extension department will cooperate in this project and will furnish specialists in the branches which are taken up, and upon a completion of the project we will hold an achievement day when the parents and friends will be invited to the shop to see the work done. Prizes will be given at this meeting and at the Lane county fair next September for the best display."

LEVITSKI COMING HERE

WORLD FAMOUS PIANIST TO APPEAR JANUARY 14

Concert to Be Given in Music Auditorium at University of Oregon

Mischa Levitski, world famous pianist is to be presented in a recital January 14, by the university school of music. In a sense this is to be one of the most unique concerts ever to be given in Eugene inasmuch as it is an experiment to test the people of Eugene as to the desirability of good music of this type and it is the first appearance of an internationally known artist in the music auditorium.

This concert has been underwritten by a resident of the city, one interested in high class music. However, if the people of this city support the concert strongly enough, and show that they really want concerts of this sort, the school will be better able to sponsor future recitals and thus bring musicians here for Eugene people, who at present must journey to Portland to hear them, it is stated.

Mischa Levitski is one of the world's greatest pianists and has appeared in recitals all over the world, this being his ninth tour of the United States. He has appeared with all the great symphony orchestras in America, including 19 appearances with the New York Symphony orchestra.
