PLANNING COMMISSION TO MEET WITH REGENTS

Zoning Ordinance For District Suggested

FIRE RISK OBJECTED TO

Group of Buildings on West of Campus Held Hazard to University; School Sale Opposed

Establishment of a fire zoning plan to include the university district will be discussed at the next regular meeting of the city planning commission, which will be held jointly with the regents of the University of Oregon.

Decision to invite the regents to meet with the planning commission was reached at a meeting of the latter body last night when a letter from a committee of the board of regents called attention to the increasing fire hazard in the vicinity of the university.

S. M. Calkins, secretary of the planning commission, was instructed to obtain a copy of the Portland zoning ordinance.

Establishments Opposed
The letter from the regents called special attention to the development near the university of buildings and establishments objectionable either as fire risks, distraction from the proper work of the students or as resorts of questionable influence on the students.

Opposition to the establishment of pool and billiard halls, public dance halls and other places of amusement which tend to distract the students from their studies, exploit them financially, or subject them to doubtful moral influences, was voiced by the commission.

"Rapidly increasing fire risks to the university buildings, caused by the springing up on the west side of the campus of closely congested groups of cheaply constructed wooden store buildings, is evident," said the letter, in part, and "should the recent proposal of the Eugene board of education to sell the Patterson school for business sites be carried out, this fire hazard will shortly be made radically worse."

Paul Kelly Resigns
Other matters taken up by the planning commission last night included the resignation of Paul Kelly, who stated in a letter to the commission that owing to other business he was not enabled to give the time necessary to the work of the planning commission. The resignation was filed and the commission members decided to ask Mayor E. H. Lee to appoint two others to fill the vacancies caused by the death of Dr. N. C. Nelson and the resignation of Mr. Kelly.

People submitting plans for approval were asked to show artifacts, plans and blueprints and to also show the contours of the ground in 10-foot contours. Plans on hand will be referred back for this data.

Mr. Moore's Fair, H. R. Ruth, and W. R. Wilson were named a committee of three to investigate the cost of setting an expert to plan the city and make a plan, not also to persons who could be obtained to do this work.

The city council will also be asked to instruct the city engineer to prepare a map of the city and surrounding territory for the planning commission.

TEACHING RECORD MADE

MENTAL TEST EXPLAINED

PROFESSOR TAYLOR TALKS BEFORE ROTARIANS

High School Graduates May All Have to Be Examined for College Entrance in Near Future

That the time may come in the not very distant future when psychological tests will be made of candidates seeking entrance to all universities, was the thought conveyed to Rotarians at the regular luncheon meeting yesterday noon in the Osburn hotel, by Professor Howard R. Taylor, professor of psychology at the University of Oregon.

Professor Taylor said that there was a large percentage of high school graduates not fitted to take up the work of a college course and that these tests would do much to aid the authorities in determining who should and who should not enter. He intimated that further preparation was needed by many leaving the high schools.

Despite the fact that these high school graduates had passed the examinations, he said, there was still much room for improvement before the step into an institution of higher learning was made.

Professor Taylor gave the psychological tests to freshmen entering the University of Oregon here last fall.

STANDARD OIL COMPANY BEGINS ON BUILDING

Permit Issued for Erection of Schaefer Bros' Three-Story Garage

STAGE LINE IS SOLD

H. C. HICKMAN SELLS INTERESTS IN REPORT

Oregon Stages, Inc., Takes Over Eugene-Bend Line; M. A. Reed to Move Here from Salem

Purchase of the Eugene-Bend stage line by the Oregon Stages, Inc., incorporated, the newly formed system of stage operations in this state, was announced last night by M. A. Reed, first vice-president of the latter company.

Mr. Reed and H. C. Hickman were the former proprietors of the Eugene-Bend stage line and have been given considerable credit for pioneering over the McKenzie pass with a snow motor during the last few months.

In the sale of the line, it was announced that Mr. Hickman had relinquished his interests but would continue to operate the Mo-hawk valley stage line to Marcola, Wendling and other points. Mr. Reed, by virtue of his office with the Oregon Stages, retains interest in the subsidized company.

Mr. Reed also announced last night that he would move to Eugene from Salem to better handle the office of general district manager of all points south of Salem. Alex. Morgenson will remain here and will have charge of the terminal garage and the motor maintenance work and servicing of the big stage buses.

First a d. k. for all stages have been ordered and will be installed within a few more weeks, it was said.

TIMBER CUT IN FOREST

REPORT MADE BY TWO SUPERVISORS HERE

Twenty-five Per Cent of Sum Realized From Sales Turned Back To Counties

During the year 1925, 20,635,556 feet of timber was cut in the Cascade national forest valued at \$34,884, according to a report issued at the office of Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor, yesterday. Twenty-five per cent of this sum is turned into the treasury of Lane county.

The cut in timber during 1924 when over 30,000,000 feet was cut. The report shows that 41 gallons of pitch were sold from the forest. J. H. Blakely of Albany extracted the pitch from trees on Fall creek.

In the Stahow forest there were 11 sales of timber with a total cut of 13,117,360 feet, valued at \$30,254.75, according to a report made at the office of R. S. Shelley, supervisor.
