NEW TEACHER ELECTED

SPRINGFIELD SCHOOL BOARD FILLS VACANCY

Insurance on New Brattain Grade Building Increased \$10,000; Total Raised to \$20,000

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., Jan. 6.—Mrs. Georgia Puckett was elected to teach in Springfield schools at a meeting of the district school board held here last night.

The resignation of Miss Hazel Stevens, primary teacher, was accepted by the board and Mrs. Puckett will take her place in the school system. Miss Stevens resigned her position because of ill health.

The board voted to increase the insurance on the new Brattain grade school building by \$10,000. The building was not insured to the full extent after being taken over by the district. The total insurance on the structure and furniture is now \$20,000. The building was accepted from George Perkins contractor, in December and was officially recorded as accepted last night.

Application for payment of street improvements on Tenth street under the Bessoff act was made by the body and other routine business was taken care of.

TWINS HAVE BIRTHDAY

SPRINGFIELD AND EUGENE MEN ARE 67 YEARS OF AGE

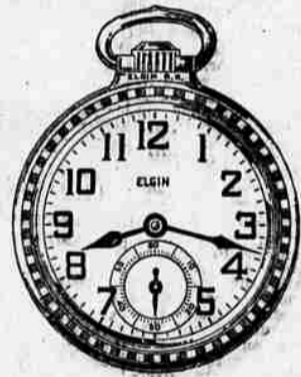
