HOUNDS DEFEAT BARBERS
IN COUNTY HOOP CONTESTEd Johnson and Anderson
Lead in Scoring

The fast traveling hounds defeated the R. A. Babb Hardware basketball quintet 27 to 19 in the only county league game played in the city last night.

By virtue of this win the Hounds are leading the league with the Comets placing a close second.

In the game last night the playing was closer than the score indicates as both teams were finding the basket with equal ability until the final quarter when the Hounds took a commanding lead.

Ed Johnson, flashy forward for the winners, was the outstanding point guard of the contest. He dropped in enough baskets to bring his evening's total to 17. Louie Anderson, former Oregon football quarter playing forward for the Barbers, shot a close second, making a total of 8.

The hatchery department of the state game commission liberated 34,644,673 trout in Oregon waters during 1925, according to the December report just issued by M. L. Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries. About 2,847,652 fry remain to be liberated in the spring. Five million of the fish liberated were over six inches in length.

During the year 81,500,452 eggs were taken and 43,084,744 eggs were hatched. Over 13,000,000 of the eggs were eastern brook trout taken in November.

Larger ponds are being constructed at many of the hatcheries in order that more fish may be held over. This work is very important Ryckman says. He believes it preferable to liberate 100,000 five or six-inch fingerlings than 500,000 small fry.

Nearly 2,000,000 crabs, bass and catfish were salvaged from flooded areas and planted. The report mentions stocking of between 45 and 50 virgin mountain lakes.

About 500,000 gammarus have been received from the Nevada game department in exchange for steelhead eggs. They will be planted next spring.

SCHAEFER AGAIN HOLDS
WORLD'S BILLIARD TITLEBelgian Champion Defeated
In Sensational Match

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 6.—Young Jake Schaefer, twice former champion, today regained the world's title at 18:2 ballroom billiards to the United States when he defeated Edouard Horemans, Belgian title holder, 1500 to 500 after three 500 point blocks of play.

The score for the final 500 point block today was:
Schaefer 540, Horemans 318.
Schaefer compiled the phenomenal average of 93 12-14 for his 16 innings during the two nights and afternoon of play. It has not been long, however, since the los-

er's average of 55 10-16 would have been considered excellent.
From the opening inning Monday night Horemans was forced to fight an uphill battle, and virtually no one credited him with a chance after Schaefer took the first block 600 to 375.

When the little champion emerged from last night's play with a deficit of 428 points, his chance to retain the title virtually was nullified.
Despite Horemans' extremely poor showing when his total is compared with Schaefer's, he twice scored higher runs than the American. Horemans' 243 in the final inning of the opening block was the high run of the match, and his 231, scored today in his dying effort to retain the championship was better than anything Schaefer could do.
